Ontario Mecca for Parched Host With Opening Sale of 4 by 4 Suds Carrying Disappointing Wallop

OTTAWA, May 21.—Real beer was on sale legally today in Ontario, Canada's banner province, for the first time in eight years and thirty Americans in the border cities took full advantage of their opportunities. The provisional authorities regard this four by four beer as non-intoxicating and perhaps it is going to disappoint parched throats from Volstead land. It is 4.4 per cent alcohol by weight, or 2.5 by volume, with a kick presumably less potent than the disappointing 2.7 beer sold in the United States under wartime prohibition. The one half of one percent limit of the Volstead act refers to volume.

Four by four has already been christened "Fergie's foam" since it is sponsored by the Ferguson government, which believes it will be beneficial in satisfying thirst without having folks revert to poor bootleg whiskey.

BUFFALO, N. Y., May 21.—Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel of the anti-Saloon League of America in a statement today disagreed with the optimistic reports from across the border.

"Canadian 4.4 proof spirits beer is a misnomer," he asserted after communicating with Canadian cities by telephone. "This Canadian experiment will give the people of the United States a chance to see the wisdom or folly of this scheme. Uncle Sam will observe the experiment with his tongue against his cheek and continue to speed up law enforcement."

DISMISSAL OF ROSS IS UPHELD IN COURT TEST

Fish Commissioner Ousted for Hiring Shoemaker Loses in Contest.

CHARGES NO MATTER

Judge Hewitt Merely Finds That Governor Pierce Acted Within His Jurisdiction.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 21.—Circuit Judge Hewitt today threw out of court the quo warranta proceedings by which Dr. Thomas attempted to regain his place on the fish commission.

Judge Hewitt held that Governor Walter M. Pierce was within his legal rights when he removed Dr. Ross, and refused to interfere. John W. Kaate, who, with W. W. Banks, appeared for Dr. Ross said the matter of appeal to the supreme court was undecided and if appeal is not taken that John C. Veatch, named by the governor to succeed Ross, will have his place on the commission free from attack.

"Whether the allegations and the charges are true or not, the court does not undertake to say," said Judge Hewitt.

"The court cannot pass upon the truth of the facts alleged or interfere with the discretion of the executive.

"Whether this court would have reached the same conclusion as to the facts at which the governor arrived is not for the court to say. "Under the decisions the court cannot weigh the evidence for the purpose of determining its preponderance.

"At most it can examine the evidence to ascertain if the governor exceeded his jurisdiction by deciding without any evidence.

"After an examination of the transcript of the proceedings held before the governor, the court cannot say there is no evidence reasonably tending to sustain the charges or the governor's decision.

"It therefore appears he did not exceed his jurisdiction in that respect and, having acted with his jurisdiction in deciding the question of fact, this court is without authority to say whether his judgment was good or bad."

Ross was discharged after a hearing before the governor, principally on charges of extravagance based on the fact that, with Commissioner, Kendall, he voted to hire Carl D. Shoemaker as office manager of the commission at \$500 a month, after Shoemaker had been removed as master fish warden.

Ross was appointed to the commission in June, 1923, and removed in January, 1925.

NEW DEPUTY GRAND MASTER OF I. O. O. F. IS ROSEBURG MAN

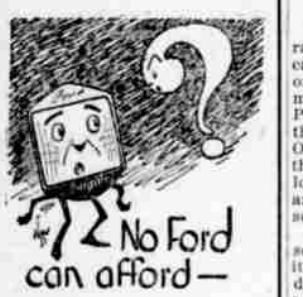

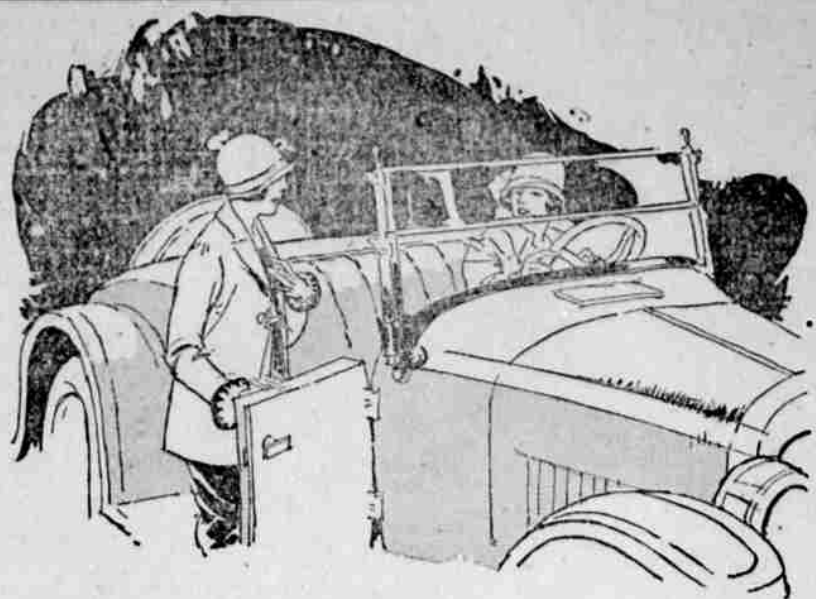

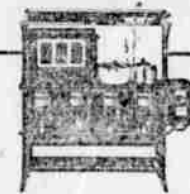

OREGON FIGHTING BAD MOTHER FOR \$200,000 ESTATE

SALEM, Ore., May 21.—Whether the state of Oregon shall acquire by escheat the estate of the late Mrs. Aemus Brix of Astoria, amounting to \$200,000, or whether the estate wholly or in part shall go to the alleged natural but faithless mother of Mrs. Brix, a resident of Germany, is the issue in a case to be fought out in court. The state land board today employed Norblad and Hesse, lawyers of Astoria, to assist District Attorney Lieneweber of Clatsop county, in the case, and it will be necessary for Hesse to make a trip to Germany in connection with the case.

The case is unusual. The foster parents of Mrs. Brix are said to live near Salem, but their names could not be ascertained here today. To them it was her desire to leave some of her estate. Also she desired to leave \$25,000 to a Lutheran church at Astoria. But she left no will and the church has been informed that it has no claim on the estate.

The mother in Germany is said to have discarded the child soon after birth and given her to a couple emigrating to America and who became the foster parents. A Portland attorney, it is said, has appeared with alleged power of attorney from the mother in Germany, seeking to get the estate. The land board doubts the existence of the German claimant.

FORMER GOVERNOR DAVIS NOT GUILTY; FACES 2ND CHARGE

TOPEKA, Kans., May 21.—Cleared by a jury in the first case in which the state asked his conviction, former Governor Jonathan M. Davis today faced the prospect of trial on another charge of bribery growing out of the pardon scandal, which broke in the last days of his administration early this year. A jury after deliberating three hours and taking four ballots, last night returned a verdict of not guilty for Davis on a charge of conspiracy with Carl J. Peterson, former state bank commissioner, to solicit a bribe for a pardon for Walter Grundy, convicted bank wrecker.

There remains now against the former governor and his son, Russell G. Davis, a charge of accepting a bribe in connection with the issuance of a pardon to Fred W. Pollman, convicted forger.

CAPTURED AUTOS TURNED AGAINST BOOZE RUNNERS

WASHINGTON, May 21.—Thirty motor cars, seized from bootleggers, were turned against the Canadian border rum runners today by the treasury which for the first time made use of a recent legislation under which the government is empowered to use the confiscated vehicles. Orders were sent to John C. Tulloch, customs collector at Ogdenburg, N. Y., to hand over the machines to members of the customs' service border patrol and they will go into service at the beginning of the annual move of Americans to Canada for summer vacations. The treasury's action is regarded as the first step toward motorization of border patrols, both the Canadian and Mexican, to be completed as fast as machines are available.

Collector Tulloch has 160 cars, all seized in the last year.
