### NOTICE TO EXTERMINATE GROUND SQUIRRELS AND OTHER NOXIOUS RODENTS WITHIN SPECIAL RODENT DISTRICT.

Notice is hereby given that the County Court of Douglas County, Oregon, has, by order duly made and entered, declared the following described area, to-wit:

Beginning at the northeast corner of Section 25 in Township 25 South, Range 3, West of the Willamette Meridian, running thence South along section lines 10 miles to the southeast corner of Section 12 in Township 27 South, Range 3 West; thence West along section lines 12 miles to the southwest corner of section 7 in Township 27 South, Range 4 West; thence North along Section line 8 miles to the Northwest corner of Section 6 in Township 26 South, Range 4 West; thence East along section line 6 miles to the Northeast corner of Section 1 in Township 26 North, Range 4 West; thence North along section lines 2 miles to the Northwest corner of Section 39 in Township 25 South, Range 3 West; thence East along section lines 6 miles to the place of beginning.

To be a special rodent and predatory animal district, and every person, firm, co-partnership, company and corporation owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having charge of or dominion over any land, place, building, structure, wharf, pier or dock within said area, which is infested with ground squirrels or other noxious rodents must at once or as soon as the presence of said ground squirrels or noxious rodents shall come to his, their or its knowledge, and, in any event, not later than thirty days from the first publication of this notice, which is May 14, 1925, proceed and continue in good faith to exterminate and destroy such rodents by poisoning, trapping or other appropriate and effective means.

## BRYAN IS CENTER OF PRESBYTERIAN MODERATOR FIGHT

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 2.—Dr. Charles K. Erdman of Princeton, this afternoon was elected moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America. He was one of three candidates nominated.

Dr. Erdman was elected on the second ballot. His election is regarded as a victory for the conservatives.

COLUMBUS, O., May 21.—The 157th general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. He was one of today, saw militant fundamentalists going into the fight for the moderatorship at odds with William Jennings Bryan, most prominent of the conservatives in the group's selection of a candidate.

Mr. Bryan is standing firmly for Dr. W. O. Thompson, president of the Ohio State University at Columbus, Ohio, for the post, while other fundamentalists at a mass conference decided to back Dr. Lapsey A. McAfee of Berkeley, California.

The larger group, however, has not despaired of winning Mr. Bryan over and are continuing efforts to have him change his stand.

LINCOLN, Ky., May 21.—Matters relating to the future growth of the Presbyterian Church in the United States (South) and plans for the work during the coming year were before the general assembly which convened in sixty-fifth annual session here today. More than 300 delegates and commissioners were expected to be present. The keynote of the assembly was sounded by the retiring moderator, Dr. Thornton Whaling of Louisville, in his annual sermon.

It would be disloyalty to Jesus, His church and teachings "not to insist that Jesus Christ must always and forever have the supreme place everywhere," declared in his sermon today.

The minister who can put all the crowns on the head of Jesus, "may belong somewhere but not with us," Dr. Miller said. "The time has come when our whole church ought to be alert and careful, not suspicious and vindictive, but wisely alive and thoroughly informed as to the teachings in its schools.

"To offer to the heathen world a Jesus who can be modified to suit their false philosophies is at once to betray Him and them. The evangelism of Paul knew nothing of such unhalloved compromise, and though he met bitter opposition, he won thousands of converts. Victory will be ours if we put all the crowns on the head of Jesus our Lord and Savior."

## VICTIM OF NIECE'S ABDUCTOR IS DYING SLAYER IS HUNTED

(Associated Press Special Wire.) WINTHROP, MAINE, May 21.—The second man hunt within a month through the woods of northern New England was in progress today for the man who shot down Mrs. Emma Towns at her cottage on Lake Marnacook, yesterday, and is then believed to have kidnaped her 35-year old niece, Aida Hayward, after setting fire to the cottage.

Mrs. Towns was unconscious today, and persons said she was dying. She told of a man who fired at her twice without warning.

She fell, heard the man speak to her niece about money and jewelry and then saw them both leave. The man returned, she said, and apparently taking her for dead, set fire to the house.

The flaming building roused the town and sent armed posses into the woods similar to the chase three weeks ago of Earl Woodward and 11 year old Lucille Chatterton, his employer's daughter.

These posses however, were not hopeful of such a happy outcome as that of the Vermont case which ended with Woodward's acquittal Tuesday. Woodward kidnaped the girl from a loney farm, that she might have a better environment.
