"It is quite likely that an effort will be made to induce Congress to pass an act providing for the benefits of each state government, equal to the difference from the returns of withdrawn areas and their pro rata part of what they would pay if taxed. Withdrawn areas, it is believed, should return to each state an amount equal to the share of their taxation were they not reserved by the government.

The committee will start its hearings in Arizona, and will then adjourn until August 24, when hearings will start again at Salt Lake. The committee will then visit Montana, Washington and Oregon, reaching Oregon in September, according to present arrangements.

ALLEGED FORGER IS ARRESTED.

James Wilson of Days Creek was arrested last night charged with forgery. CENTRAL STATES SIZZLE AS LAKE REGION FREEZES

CHICAGO, May 23.—Sizzling heat in the Southern and Central States and freezing temperatures in Minnesota and Northern Michigan with snow and a gale of wind in the latter section, produced the most remarkable situation today that Professor Henry J. Cox, district weather forecaster said he had ever observed.

There were prospects that the temperatures in Chicago might again duplicate yesterday's high temperature of 94 degrees, equaling all May records, before the heat from the north breaks the cold wave later today or tonight. While the mercury was mounting here, reaching 80 at 10:30 a. m., a freezing temperature was recorded at Duluth, Minn., and at Houghton, Michigan, with snow blowing over the northern end of Michigan. Across the Canadian border the cold had forced down temperatures to 26 at White River and 24 at Cochrane, Ont.

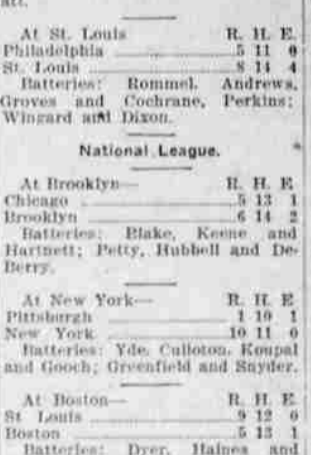
