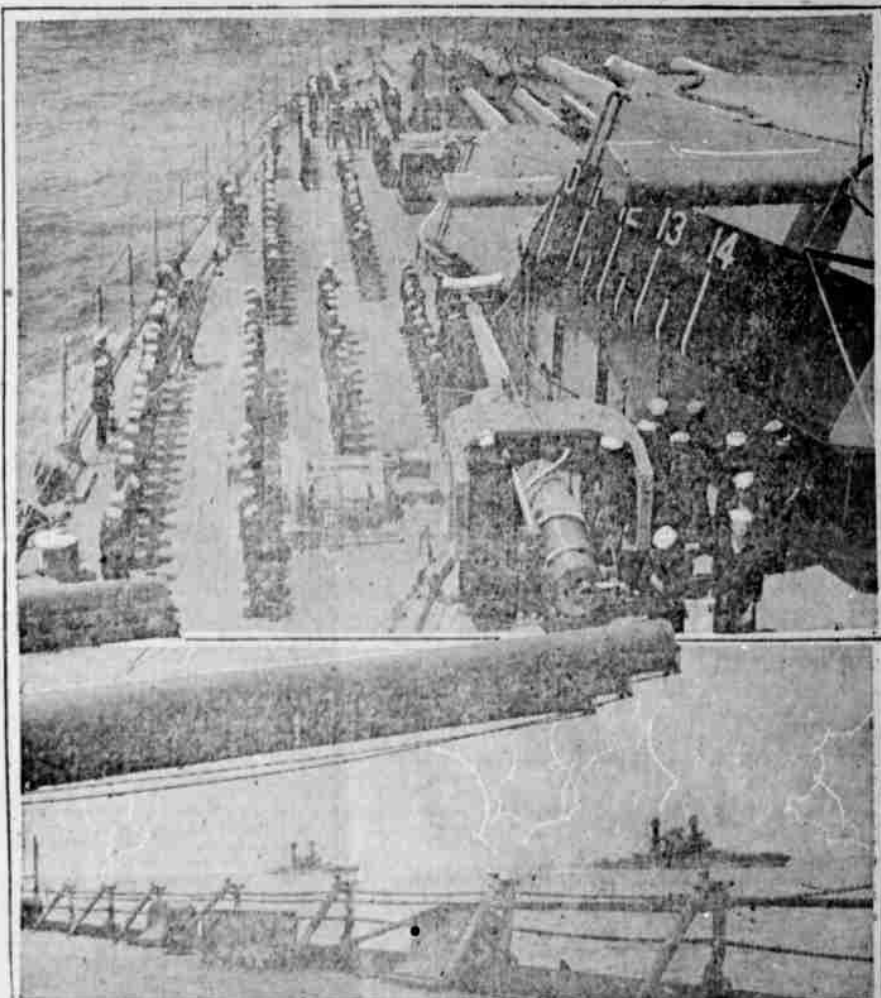
Those who made their getaway were Bob Spooner, sentenced to a year on a liquor charge; Jay Upson, in for a year on a statutory conviction; James O'Connor, awaiting trial on a liquor charge, and Charles Williams and Lee Adams, arrested Saturday on liquor charges. Tom Culbertson, one of the two prisoners who did not go out with the others, saw Upson unlocking a door, he said. Four doors were unlocked.

THREE MEN PERISH IN FIRE; CIGARETTE STUB HELD CAUSE

(Associated Press Local Wire.) MARTINEZ, Cal., May 25.—burial of Oregon, who died yesterday in a fire which destroyed a two-story garage and outbuilding on the Farmalee ranch two miles from Concord. All three were apparently overcome by smoke as they slept, and perished in their beds in the second story of the garage building.

The dead are James Greenan, tractor driver, and Joseph Asyido, truck driver, both of Concord, and George Jones, a painter of Oakland. The loss is estimated at \$25,000. The fire is believed to have started from a discarded cigarette stub.
