BOOKLETS FOR PUBLICITY ARE NOW OFF PRESS

News-Review Job Printing Department Completes Large Contract.

DISTRIBUTION STARTS

Booklets Contain Much Descriptive Matter to Attract Home-seekers to Douglas Co.

The publicity booklet issued by the Douglas county Chamber of Commerce is now off the presses of the exclusive job printing department of the News-Review, and is now being delivered for distribution. The county Chamber of Commerce is receiving 15,000 copies of this booklet, which is the largest and most complete ever printed in Roseburg.

The booklet is profusely illustrated throughout. The first half is devoted to page layouts featuring the advantages of each municipality of the county. The cities are listed in alphabetical order, one on each page showing pictures of prominent buildings, road scenes, pictures of agricultural products, amusement facilities, etc. The towns mentioned are Canyonville, Drain, Elkton, Gardiner, Glendale, Myrtle Creek, Oakland, Reedsport, Riddle, Roseburg, Sutherlin and Yoncalla. In connection with each city there is a short written telling of the advantages offered by each of the cities and surrounding communities.

A number of pages are devoted to an untold discussion of the many resources, advantages, facilities and industries offered by Douglas County. Interesting tables show the timber and mineral wealth of the county. Agricultural and horticultural products are listed and described, and quantities of shipments worked out in statistical form.

Douglas County's weather records are shown in an official statement from the U. S. Weather Bureau, and the particularly temperate climate is stressed throughout the booklet. Each page contains pertinent paragraphs each stressing some particular item pertaining to the county.

One striking feature of this booklet is the fact that Douglas County is the keynote rather than any one particular municipality or town. It is in truth a county booklet, and is in every respect a complete descriptive account which should intensify interest any prospective settler.

The various products are listed individually, with short comments on each. Nothing is colored, the information being unadorned and "frugal" in every respect. No item which might be of interest to the person seeking a home in Oregon has been overlooked, and the booklet should prove of untold value in bringing new people into this territory.

In addition to the titles listed in the booklet, paragraphs describing the county are given to Kellough, Dillard, Glide, Melrose, Looking Glass, Tiller, Scottsburg, Canas Valley, Leon Lake, Wilbur, Winchester, Umpqua, Garden Valley, Edenburg, Dixonville, Perdis, Happy Valley, Greens, and others. Nearly every one of the communities listed have ordered from 350 to 1,000 copies of the booklet, and an advertisement for each of these cities appears on the back of the booklet.

The booklet is the product of the News-Review department and typographically is one of the largest jobs of its kind ever taken in this county.

TANGLED THREADS IN WAR RECORDS BEING UNRAVELED

Endowment Fund Will Enable American Legion to Continue Work for Disabled Veterans on Permanent Basis.

Tangled threads in their war records which the government is not in position to unravel told many disabled World War veterans outside the reach of governmental relief, according to Miss Jane V. Doyle, executive secretary of the Portland, Oregon, Chapter of the American Red Cross. Credit for unraveling these threads in many cases under her observation and bringing to the disabled men the aid to which their services entitled them is given by Miss Doyle to The American Legion.

Cross workers, has been active in bringing relief to distressed former service men and their dependents. Speaking of the activities of The American Legion in this sphere, she said:

"Up to the time of the decentralization of the Veterans Bureau office to a Regional office in this city, when there was no longer any need of such service, we found the co-operation of the National American Legion Representative in the District office at Seattle invaluable. If time and space permitted we would quote dozens of instances from our files of compensation and hospitalization claims settled and vocational training established.

"Even with the Red Cross representative also on hand the work was so heavy and complicated at times that we knew our problems needed the additional effort and our claims the support of the Legion representative to get straightened out. This help was always given in a cheerful spirit and with a force that gave us courage many times when we might have given up in our efforts with the United States Veterans Bureau. I do not mean to imply criticism of the latter, but frequently there are tangled threads which the government office is not in a position to unravel, and it has been at such times that the Legion representative has been most valuable.

"I am much interested in the Endowment Fund and wish it every success."

The five million dollar endowment fund which The American Legion is raising, will enable it to continue and put on a permanent basis its work for the disabled former service men. It will assure those who give their health and strength for their country there always will be a helping hand for them in times of need. Earnings of the fund will go also to care for orphans of former service men and assist in placing them in good homes.

ANNUAL POPPY SALE TO BE HELD FRIDAY, MAY 29

The annual poppy sale, sponsored by the American Legion auxiliary for the disabled veterans, will take place on Friday, May 29. These poppies are sold each year, just before Memorial Day, and the proceeds used for the relief of the veterans in hospitals, scores of disabled and needy ex-service men, equipped heroes of Chemin des Dames and the Argonne, Chateau Thierry and Verdun, are busily at work in various cities throughout the United States making the thousands of Buddy Poppies for the annual national Poppy Sale.

The majority of poppies for the national sale are being made in Boston, Massachusetts, where in a specially equipped V. F. W. Poppy Factory and in U. S. Veterans Hospital No. 44, a force of veterans are actively adding hundreds of poppies daily to the 2,500,000 quills they have set for themselves. In many states, however, poppies for the local sale are being made within the state by the state's own war-veterans.

The Buddy Poppy label which is on every flower has been formally registered to prevent any infringement upon it, and to guarantee to the public the actual manufacture of the poppies by disabled and needy ex-service men. "Buddy Poppy" is the name the men themselves selected for the flower. The entire proceeds from the sale are used for relief work.

Almost all the disabled poppy makers are unable to be rehabilitated by the Veterans Bureau because their disability was not contemplated by the War Risk and Vocational Training Law, when passed, and are designated as "non-releasable." To these men in particular, the poppy-making offers a means of livelihood which the majority, because of their crippled condition, would be helpless to earn in their former occupations and also helps to renew their self-confidence and rebuild their morale.
