PRUNE CROP IS NOT ALL LOST; CHERRIES CONTINUE TO DROP

PORTLAND Ore., May 27.—The weather has been favorable for all small grain, except for some local damage by hail in Crook county, says the weekly crop report for Oregon issued today by the weather bureau.

Prunes and cherries continue to drop in western counties but the prune crop in some localities is better than was anticipated.

The drop of pears has ceased in some southern localities and continues in others. Strawberries are plentiful in market. Raspberries are ripening in southern counties and a few early cherries are turning.

Improved pasturage is reflected in the condition of livestock, which is generally good to excellent. Shearing of sheep continues in many places. Stock is being moved rapidly to summer ranges.

Early potatoes are doing well.
