## COMMUNISTS OF FRANCE DECRY WAR AGAINST RIFFIANS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PARIS, May 28.—Deputy Maginot, of the republican-democratic bloc, today announced that the opposition in the Chamber of Deputies would vote confidence in the Painleve government's Moroccan policy. This was taken to insure a government majority on the question.

M. Maginot said the opposition accepted the resolution of confidence proposed by the left bloc, because it was to the national interest to support the government's policy of resistance to the invasion of French Morocco by Abd-el-Krim. Premier Painleve announced to the chamber that French losses in the Riflian war were 490 killed, 1100 wounded and 35 missing, one third of the casualties being French and the remainder Senegalese. The figures cover losses since the beginning of the recent operations against the Riffs. Painleve's declaration caused a great outcry from communists in the chamber, who shouted "down with the war."

### LEGION TO HELP CLEAR MCKENZIE PASS OF SNOW.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

BEND, Ore., May 28.—The McKenzie pass will be opened for automobiles within two weeks, in the opinion of a visitor at the summit yesterday. Thirty feet of snow in the cut was being dynamited by three men of the bureau of public roads today and posts of the American Legion in central Oregon and the Willamette valley plan to unite Sunday, May 31, in a concentrated effort to open the road over the summit. When the 30-foot bank is broken up the snow will melt sufficiently that cars will be able to cross within two weeks at least.

## WHITE NOT FOUND, JURY TASK WEARY IN SHEPHERD CASE

CHICAGO, May 28.—James Callan, politician, cited to show cause why he should not be held for contempt for approaching a venireman in the trial of William D. Shepherd, charged with murder, today was discharged on motion of Assistant States Attorney Gorman. Callan had denied making any improper suggestion to the venireman, Philip Barry.

The assistant state's attorney, after reading Callan's replies to the state's 23 interrogatories, told Judge Lynch there was nothing to do but discharge Callan, under the holdings of the state supreme court, and Callan was discharged.

CHICAGO, May 28.—Interest in the swiftly moving side drama of the Shepherd case, depicting alleged bribery and attempted jury fixing, is now divided between the search in New York for Robert White, state's witness, and disclosures said to have been made to the state's attorney's office on why White fled.

Nearly as unsuccessful as the search for White has been the selection of a jury that is to try William D. Shepherd on a charge of murdering his millionaire ward, William M. McClintock. No progress was made in yesterday's questioning of veniremen, and as court opened today the call for veniremen was well down in the third special panel of 100. Only three jurors were definitely accepted.

John J. Kelly, insurance agent and chiropractor, accused in a letter purported to have been written by White in Philadelphia as being one of the persons who caused him to disappear, was credited with admissions to the prosecutors which gave them satisfaction.

"Kelly told a whole lot Tuesday and he told a whole lot more today," said State's Attorney Crowe last night. He was confident regarding the outcome of a hearing this morning of a petition for a writ of habeas corpus in Kelly's behalf. "Kelly's statement is of great importance," said Assistant state's Attorney Joseph Savage. "I must withhold it until certain other persons are located."

He admitted they were the men named by White as knowing much of his affairs relating to the Shepherd trial.

White had corroborated the confession of C. C. Falman, who said he plotted with Shepherd to kill McClintock by the use of typhoid germs.

### BERLENBACH AND McTIGUE CLASH TOMORROW NIGHT.

NEW YORK, May 28.—he elusive Mike McTigue is expected to change his style of battle tomorrow night, when he risks his light-heavyweight title in a 15-round bout at the Yankee Stadium with the hard hitting Paul Berlebach. Mike must abandon the defensive tactics that have characterized his non-decision bouts and exchange blows with his challenger, "the knockout king" in the opinion of critics, or he will lose his crown on a decision. There is a strong belief that Berlebach will render a decision unnecessary but McTigue's friends say he can punch hard when his ire is aroused.

### NOTICE TO EXTERMINATE GROUND SQUIRRELS AND OTHER NOXIOUS RODENTS WITHIN SPECIAL RODENT DISTRICT.

Notice is hereby given that the County Court of Douglas County, Oregon, has by order duly made and entered, declared the following described area, to-wit:

Beginning at the northeast corner of Section 25 in Township 25 South, Range 3, West of the Willamette Meridian, running thence South along section lines 10 miles to the Southeast corner of Section 12 in Township 27 South, Range 3 West; thence West along section lines 12 miles to the Southwest corner of section 7 in Township 27 South, Range 4 West; thence North along Section line 8 miles to the Northwest corner of Section 6 in Township 26 South, Range 4 West; thence East along section line 6 miles to the Northeast corner of Section 1 in Township 26 South, range 4 West; thence North along section lines 2 miles to the Northwest corner of Section 30 in Township 25 South, Range 3 West; thence East along section lines 6 miles to the place of beginning.

To be a special rodent and predatory animal district, and every person, firm, co-partnership, company and corporation owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having charge of or dominion over any land, place, building, structure, wharf, pier or dock within said area, which is infested with ground squirrels or other noxious rodents must at once or as soon as the presence of said ground squirrels or noxious rodents shall come to his, their or its knowledge, and, in any event, not later than thirty days from the first publication of this notice, which is May 14, 1925, proceed and continue in good faith to exterminate and destroy such rodents by poisoning, trapping or other appropriate and effective means.

The following poison for the extermination and destruction of such ground squirrels is hereby recommended, to-wit: Strychnine (Alkaloid) used on either barley or wheat (barley preferred), mixed according to the following formula and manner, to-wit:

Barley, clean grain 16 quarts; Strychnine (Alkaloid) 1 ounce; Bicarbonate of soda (baking soda) 1 ounce, this starch paste 3-4 pint; heavy corn syrup 1-4 pint; Glycerine 1 tablespoonful; Saccharine 1-10 ounce.

Mix thoroughly the 1 ounce of powdered strychnine (Alkaloid) and 1 ounce common baking soda. Sift this into 3-4 pint of thin hot water and stir to a smooth creamy mass. (The starch paste is made by dissolving 1 heaping tablespoonful of dry glass starch in a little cold water, which is then added to 3-4 pint of boiling water. Boil and stir constantly until a clear thin paste is formed.) Add 1-4 pint heavy corn syrup and 1 tablespoonful of glycerine and stir thoroughly. Add 1-10 ounce of saccharine and stir thoroughly. Pour this mixture over 16 quarts of clean barley and mix well so that each grain is coated.

From March 1st until May 31st will be the most effective time to poison and destroy the digger squirrels as they have recently emerged from their hibernation and will take the bait readily.

The County Agent cooperating with the County Court has a quantity of the poison bait prepared and same is now on sale to the farmers or persons interested at actual cost, and this bait may be had by applying at his office in the Federal Building, Roseburg, Oregon, or at other points in each community.

If any of the persons mentioned in paragraph 1 hereof shall, within thirty days from the first publication of this notice, fail to begin, in good faith, to exterminate, eradicate and destroy as aforesaid or by any other effective means, any ground squirrels or other noxious rodents, the County Court of Douglas County, Oregon, will appoint one or more persons to proceed with the extermination and eradication of such rodents upon the land or place as aforesaid, and the costs thereof will be assessed to such land.

## ARMY BUDGET IS DUE FOR SLASH OF THIRTY MILLIONS

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The army general staff has been directed to make a study of the use of the military establishment for further progressive reductions in army appropriations under the administration's economic program. No definite information as to the contemplated aggregated cut in appropriations is available. There are indications however, that it would run to a figure of between \$25,000,000 and \$30,000,000 to be leaped off the military appropriations included in the total of \$29,797,971 appropriated for all war department activities for the 1926 fiscal year. The military portion of the budget for the year is \$25,388,674, which represented a reduction of approximately \$4,000,000 from the similar appropriations for the preceding year.

Despite rigid secrecy requirements imposed on army officials, it is known to be a matter of grave concern because of the effect a \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000 would have on the whole scheme of national defense. Some officials go so far as to contend that such a cut in appropriations would entail virtual abandonment of the organized reserve element of the new army and sharp curtailment of federal assistance to the national guard.
