DECORATION DAY

Originally established as a day for honoring the soldiers of the Civil war, the national Memorial day has become an occasion for honoring the men who fought in all the wars.

"The passions of the titanic struggle will finally enter upon the sleep of oblivion, and only its splendid accomplishments for the cause of human freedom and a united nation, stronger and richer in patriotism because of the great strife, will be remembered," said Gen. James Longstreet.

FRANCE PRETENDS TO SOCIALISTS WAR ONLY FOR SAFETY

(Associated Press London Wire.) PARIS, May 29.—The French Chamber of Deputies with the exception of communist members, unanimously stood behind the government's Moroccan policy today and gave Premier Painleve and his associates in the cabinet a vote of confidence of 537 to 29.

PARIS, May 29.—An accord regarding the French policy in Morocco was reached today by the government and the socialist bloc of the Chamber of Deputies when the government adopted the socialist order of the day for today's chamber consideration of the Moroccan question.

Military experts point out that the proportion of killed or wounded to the number of troops engaged works out at about the same ratio as in the World war. Many of the French losses are due to the expert sniping of the Rifians, who are equipped with the best rifles and know how to use them.

JUDGE DENIES STAY OF SENTENCE IN JESS BALDWIN CASE

Jess Baldwin, sentenced yesterday to 30 days in the county jail on a charge of drunkenness, was today made a member of the county road gang, and was sent to Reedsport this morning to join the crew now working on the Mill Creek road.

After a prisoner is sentenced he starts serving time immediately unless a stay of execution is granted. In cases where an appeal is to be taken such stay is usually granted, but only upon a certificate of probable cause.

In the event the certificate of probable cause is not signed by the presiding magistrate, a transcript of the proceedings in the case, together with a statement of such facts as might constitute cause for appeal, must be prepared and submitted to a supreme court justice, which takes considerable time.

It is seldom that a certificate of probable cause is ever refused by a judge, but one of the exceptions occurred last night when Judge Hamilton refused to sign the instrument. As this prevented any postponement of the sentence Baldwin went

out on the road gang this morning to serve out his time.

WHEAT OUTLOOK IN AMERICA NOT GOOD

WASHINGTON, May 29.—The favorable wheat situation last year may be reversed this season, the department of agriculture declared in its June report.

Instead of a bumper crop in time of world shortage, the report said, a poor yield appears in sight, with likelihood of better crops abroad.

The condition of the crop on May 1, was "very poor," the report added and last month cold weather was not reassuring. The spring wheat crop is yet to be made and may fare better.

(Associated Press Local Wire.) LONG VIEW, Tex., May 29.—Derailment of an International and Great Northern passenger train, two miles southwest of here last night, resulted fatally for the two engineers and at least five negro passengers.

Running late, the train, known as the Sunshine Special, rounded a curve and left the rails. The engine and three coaches tumbled to the bottom of the steep embankment the dead.

Lee Tarbuton, 55, Palestine, engineer. P. H. Griffith, 37, Palestine, fireman.

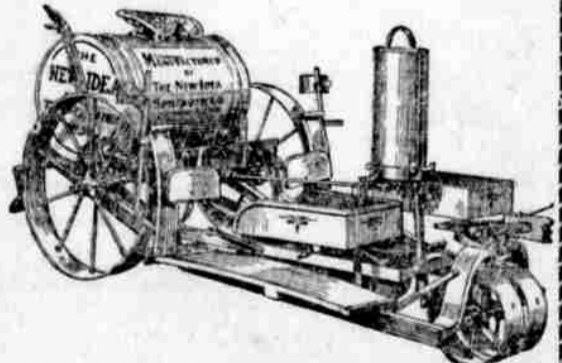
