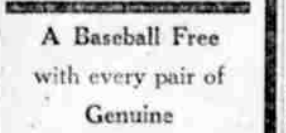

S. P. RAILWAY NOT FIGHTING HILL IS SPROULE'S CLAIM

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—Replying to published reports that the Southern Pacific company is contesting the Hill interests in the construction of new lines in Northern California and Southern Oregon, President William Sproule of the Southern Pacific said today:

"The Southern Pacific is not at war with any one, but is attending strictly to its own business. It is true we are building a line through Klamath Falls, known as the Natron cut-off, on which 52 of the 103 miles have been completed and 50 miles have been graded. About \$10,000,000 has been spent thus far. This will give us two lines from Weed to Eugene and puts Klamath Falls on a main line.

"Robert E. Strahorn is building a line east and northeast of Klamath Falls, known as the Oregon, California and Eastern. He has completed forty miles to Sprague river. As his construction aims to serve territory contiguous to our line and to Klamath Falls, we have undertaken to aid in his construction upon obtaining approval of the interstate commerce commission."

"We are prompted by the further consideration that from our Susanville branch at Wendell a narrow gauge known as the Nevada California Oregon, runs north 156 miles to Lakeview, Ore. Shippers along the line desire a standard gauge road. The Southern Pacific will finance that improvement if consent is granted by the commission. The Southern Pacific is its only competitor and the road is a natural feeder to our Central Pacific line just as the Strahorn line is a natural feeder to our Natron cut-off.

"We have not figured on building into Bend, Ore. We have not regarded Bend as tributary to our line and that territory already is well provided for, but if a line were built to Bend we are in the best position to build it as one more step in the development of our system in the northwest."
