NO COMPENSATION LAW FOR OFFICERS, THIS COUNTY SAYS

SALEM, Ore., June 2.—Of 196 cities and towns in Oregon only 17 including Portland, have rejected the opportunity for their peace officers to come under the protection of the Workmen's Compensation Act, and of 36 counties, only nine have filed rejections with the commission. The 1925 legislature amended the act so that the salaried peace officers of all cities, towns and counties under the act automatically unless the municipalities formally reject the act by notifying the commission.

ROUND ONE IN HART CASE ATTACK ON INFORMATION

TACOMA, Wash., June 2.—That the legality of the information charging former Governor Louis F. Hart with soliciting a bribe from the Union and attorney for the defunct Scandinavian Bank of Tacoma, will be attacked in Pierce county Superior Courts Saturday on the basis of demurrer expected to be filed this week, became practically certain today when Prosecuting Attorney J. W. Selden announced that Attorney Maurice A. Langhorne, counsel for the defense, had expressed willingness to argue the demurrer any time after Wednesday.

EVOLUTION ROW IN TENNESSEE NOW IN TEXT BOOK BOARD

CHICAGO, June 2.—While William J. Bryan continued both here and at Urbana, Ill., to expound his theory of the issues at stake in the Tennessee evolution law case a new move was made in Tennessee when John R. Neil, defense counsel for J. T. Scoopes brought the biology text book situation of the state under fire.

SCOOPES was charged with explaining the theory of evolution to students after he had read a passage from a biology text book authorized by the state. Mr. Neil, in a letter to Governor Austin Peary, urged that the selection of a text book on biology for use in the high schools be deferred until the Scoopes case was decided, threatening criminal prosecution against the book commission if it chose a work containing any reference to evolution.

Declaring that every standard work on science accepts evolution and that he was sure no scientist would consent to have his book mutilated to fit the Tennessee law, Mr. Neil said that if the anti-evolution law was upheld after the commission had adopted a book accepting evolution, science teachers of the state would be in the same position as Scoopes—"of either refusing to comply with his duty to teach the books selected or of violating the law."
