SECRETARY WEEKS' CONDITION SHOWS NO IMPROVEMENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
BOSTON, June 3.—The condition of Secretary of War John W. Weeks, who was operated upon for gallstones last week, was described as "not so favorable" in a bulletin issued this morning by his physicians.

The bulletin said: "Secretary Weeks' condition is not so favorable this morning. He had a restless night and has had some vomiting. His temperature is 100 and his pulse 104."

In a statement made public yesterday, the physicians attending Secretary Weeks, who submitted to the operation last Thursday, said his condition remained critical. Although no complications had developed, the statement said, Mr. Weeks had not shown the improvement expected at this stage of his treatment.

RED CROSS NURSE MAKES HEROIC RECORD IN NORTH

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
UNALASKA, Alaska, June 3.—News dispatches referring to Miss Emily Morgan, the Red Cross nurse, as the heroine of the Nome diphtheria epidemic, have reached remote Unalaska. But the people of this community are not surprised, for they recall her work here, where, as in Nome, she was the lone nurse working with the only doctor within hundreds of miles.

For 18 months Miss Morgan braved the blizzards of these Alaskan islands to bring gladness into the dingy homes of the natives. Her skill and her smile always were at the command of the people, who found her unflinching in times of illness and distress.

One of her added duties here was that of matron in the Jesse Lee Home maintained by the Methodist Women's Missionary Society for destitute waifs. Alice Devlin, one Aleutian girl brought here, had an almost incredible history. While living in a hole in the ground with a sod roof, she saw her mother devoured by starving husky dogs. She was brought to the home with a scar on her neck, an cheeks made by the dogs. Miss Morgan nursed her back to health.

Before she came to Alaska Miss Morgan had a heroic record as a Red Cross nurse with the American army in France.

MARS WARMER THAN HAD BEEN SUPPOSED ASTRONOMER AVERS

PRESCOTT, Ariz., June 3.—Dr. W. M. Slipher, director of the Lowell Observatory at Flagstaff, Ariz., when he recently predicted that planetary astronomy was on the threshold of finally accurate determinations in connection with the study of Mars.

The astronomer expressed this opinion after months of research based on observations which he and other scientists obtained last summer when Mars made its closest approach to the earth. Among the discoveries, said Dr. Slipher, is that the planet is much warmer than had been supposed and has a much denser atmosphere than it had been credited with. These determinations, he explained, are tendencies in support of the theory that the planet bears life.

The temperature of the planet was approximated by the Coblentz radiometer, one of the latest astronomical instruments, so delicate that it measures the heat of distant stars.

Dr. Slipher considers this device as important in adding to the knowledge of the temperature of planets as the Michelson interferometer is in determining the angular diameter of celestial bodies.

Dr. Slipher offered no final opinions on the gaseous and often controverted matters affecting Mars. But he emphasized, as other astronomers have, the strange regularity of the radiating lines popularly called "canals." The fading of the polar caps with the advance of the warm seasons and subsequent darkening of the arctic regions afford the greatest argument for those contending the planet is inhabited, he explained. The regularity of the "canals," he added, is evidence in favor of their artificial origin.
