DEBT PER CAPITA OF OREGON FOUR TIMES AVERAGE

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Tabulation of financial statistics of state governments just issued by the bureau of census gives Oregon the doubtful statistical distinction of having, with one exception, more than double the per capita debt of any other state, and four or five times the average for most of the states. The Oregon per capita, which is figured on net funded and floating debt less sinking fund assets is \$49.82. Only six states have an average higher than \$20 for each of its inhabitants. Bonds issued for good roads are assumed to account in large part for Oregon's showing, but no explanation accompanied the official figures.

On the side of revenues the Oregon per capita is \$21.21, which is well above the average, only North Dakota, Delaware, Wyoming and Nevada ranking higher. Washington's debt per capita is \$73.39, revenues \$26.63. Two states, Kansas and Nebraska, have no debt, and three others, Indiana, Wisconsin and Texas, less than \$1 per capita.

EXPERIMENTS POINT WAY TO NEW TYPE OF AIRPLANES

SANTA MONICA, Cal., June 4.—A tailless biplane, weighing less than 600 pounds, which may revolutionize aviation, was declared practical here recently by Professor A. A. Merrill of the California Institute of Technology, Pasadena, Cal., following what he termed "successful trial flights" at Clover field, near here, of model planes.

A man-sized plane, which will have a wing span of twenty-two feet and a length of nine feet from the propeller to the tip of the fuselage, is being constructed at Venice, Cal., near here, under the supervision of Professor Merrill. It will be driven by a light four-cylinder motorcycle engine. The ship will be tested at Clover field upon completion, which will be about two months hence.
