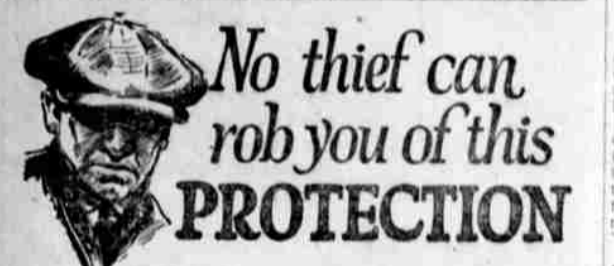

### WELDING WORKS AND RADIATOR BUSINESSES CHANGE PROPRIETORS

H. A. Calkins who several years ago was the proprietor of the Roseburg Welding and Braizing Works, and who sold out to Chester Fisher has again bought out the business and has taken charge at once. Mr. Fisher, in turn, has bought out Lar's Radiator Shop, and is moving that business to the building occupied by the welding and braizing works at the corner of Washington and Rose streets. Mr. Calkins spent three years at Chiloquin, Klamath county where he was engaged in the welding business. He sold out to go to Mexico, but became ill with appendicitis, and was forced to undergo an operation from which he has been recuperating for the past few months.

### CARBON MONOXIDE GAS KILLED THOUSANDS TOKYO, June 5.—The deaths of 33,000 persons at the army clothing depot in the quake fire of 1923 were

caused by poison gas, according to a report of the great seismic visitation now in the hands of Seismic Disaster Prevention Commission. The commission consists of 40 well known scientists and experts and includes Prof. A. Imamura of the Tokyo Imperial University and Dr. Taroakemon Nakamura, formerly of the Central Meteorological Observatory. The purpose is at aggregation of papers by these investigators covering 1,500 quarto pages. The commission is of the opinion that a great many of the earthquake victims, who were believed to have been killed by carbon monoxide gas and escaped the horror of being roasted alive. The gas, it was explained, is generated at a heat of 550 degrees. Cook with gas.
