ATTEMPTS RESCUE OF HIS EFFECTS; TRAPPED BY FIRE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—One man is dead, and three persons injured as a result of a fire which destroyed the three-story Waucoma Hotel in Linnton, a suburb, late yesterday. Joseph Jefferson, 38, tallyman employed at the Clark and Wilson Lumber Company, who was on the porch when the fire started, went into the building to get effects from his room on the third floor, but was trapped by the fire.

Sven Gustas, 23, also an employe of the mill, was bruised when he jumped from a window after finding escape from a long stairway cut off by flames. Andrew Charles, an Indian, cut his hands painfully sliding down a rope from his second floor window.

Mrs. William Cook, 71, was bruised when she was run into by a boy on a scooter as she was running to the fire. She went to the Good Samaritan hospital. Property damage was roughly estimated today at \$8,000.

STATE LAND BOARD MORTGAGE SYSTEM FACES COURT TEST
SALEM, Ore., June 6.—The interests of county courts and taxpayers throughout the state are involved in a mandamus proceeding that has been instituted in the supreme court by the state land board against the Coos county court for the collection of interest, penalty and costs on 1921 taxes on Coos county land on which the land board holds a mortgage. Collection of these funds is authorized by an act of the 1925 legislature, and the attorney-general has written an opinion holding that the act, which carried the emergency clause, is mandatory. Some county courts, including the Coos court, hold that it is optional and are refusing to remit. While less than \$100 is involved in the Coos county case, the principle attached to the case is state-wide in importance.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6.—Trial of Dorothy Ellingson, 17 years old, confessed matricide, set for June 15, today was ordered continued until August 11. The continuance was granted by the court at the request of Dorothy's counsel and City Physician Quinn, who said the girl's condition necessitated an operation for appendicitis.

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CASH NEED CREATED BY PIERCE'S VETOS
SALEM, Ore., June 6.—The state emergency board will meet this afternoon to consider emergency requests from various departments aggregating about \$50,000. Secretary of State Koser will ask about \$50,000 for the cost of administering an act passed by the 1925 legislature requiring all in a mandamus proceeding to file with the state department certificates of ownership of their vehicles.

Some other departments will ask the board to provide funds that were vetoed by Governor Pierce by his item authority in passing on appropriation bills.
