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NEW FEATURES FOR SUMMER SCHOOL AT O. A. C. THIS YEAR

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, June 8. — Many new and attractive features are planned for the twelfth annual boys' and girls' summer school to be held at the college June 15 to 27 inclusive. Classes for local leaders will be conducted, music will be furnished and led by the Paul Petri, director of the school of music, and such authorities as Walter M. Pierce, governor of Oregon, Miss Gertrude Warren of the United States Department of Agriculture, and W. J. Kerr, president of the college, will speak at the assemblies. About twenty club members are expected to attend from the following communities in Douglas County: Roseburg, Looking Glass, Canas Valley, Myrtle Creek, Riddle, Days Creek, and Yonahia. Miss Doris Larson of Roseburg, teacher and local club leader at Looking Glass this past year, will go from Douglas County as special chaperon for club members from this county. The expenses are the necessary railroad fare and \$15 for room and board. Quarters will be in the college dormitories, the girls in Waldo hall and the boys in Cauthorn hall, with meals served in Waldo. Club members will furnish their own bedding. All club members in Oregon of good standing are eligible to enroll.

"Busy at all times" is the motto of the club department. Classes will start at 8:30 and last until noon. One and one-half hours will be allowed for lunch. All club members will report at 1:30 for assembly. After assembly the "clubbers" are free to spend the afternoon at recreation of some sort provided by those in charge. Stunt shows, movies and parties are examples of the evening entertainments. The boys will be taught blacksmithing, stock judging, crop production, horticulture, farm mechanics, beekeeping, poultry, and bacteriology in such a way that they will benefit most from it. The girls' program has been increased. Baking, canning, cooking, home decoration, table service, and other home economics subjects will be taught.

ASIATIC EXPEDITION RENEWS SEARCH FOR CRADLE OF MANKIND

PEKING, June 8.—In further pursuit of its quest for traces of primitive man in the stratum of the ice age, the Third Asiatic Expedition of the New York museum of natural history, in cooperation with the American Asiatic Association has started on the first leg of its renewed penetration of the wilds of Mongolia and Chinese Turkestan. Its first permanent camp will be 1,000 miles north-west of Kalgan, on the site of last year's discovery of dinosaur eggs, which aroused such keen interest throughout the western world. Here the leader of the expedition, Roy Chapman Andrews and his corps of scientists expect to undertake the imposing transport train of 150 camels dispatched some two months ago.

The work of exploration will start at the first camp where an effort will be made to rediscover a nest of dinosaur eggs found on the last expedition, but lost again because of a terrific sand storm that changed the topography of the country. It is planned to drop off the first group of men there, where rich fields are anticipated also in fossil remains of prehistoric animals, while the main expedition continues west along the north slope of the Altai mountains and then south in the direction of Chinese Turkestan. The objective this year is to work in a more recent stratum of rocks, which might result in fossilized traces of human evolution.

"On the zoological side," Mr. Andrews explained, "we hope to get into the zone of true wild horses and wild camels. We hope to secure groups of both for the museum. We have with us also a paleontologist whose work will be to study fossilized plant life and to judge what the climate was like in the various periods. This will enable us to decide whether it is a suitable place for man, and thus of our chances of finding traces of prehistoric man."

Besides the camel transport, the expedition's equipment includes seven motor vehicles, cars and trucks, equipped with special tires for negotiating desert sands. The personnel totals 40 men, and of supplies there is being transported 2,500 gallons of gasoline and 100 gallons of oil for the cars; two tons of flour, a ton of rice, half a ton of sugar and other things in proportion. The only food supply that can be counted upon in the country to be covered is meat. The expedition expects to reach Kalgan on its return about the middle of September.

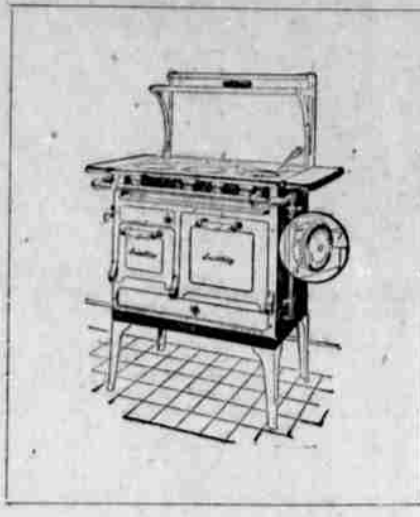

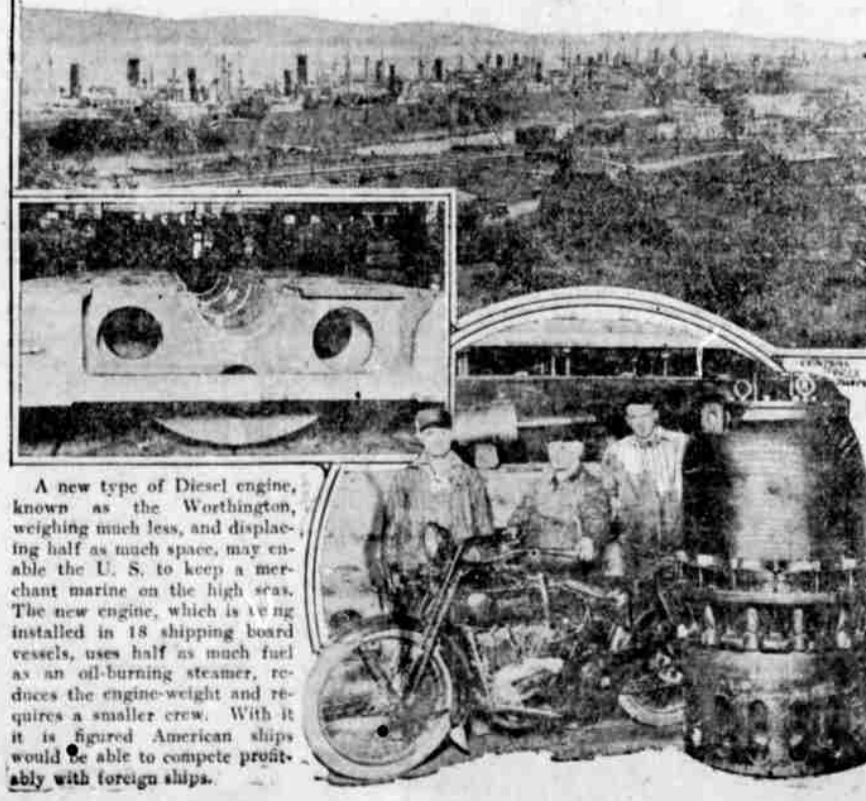

New Diesel Engine Seen as Salvation of U. S. Fleet



A new type of Diesel engine, known as the Worthington, weighing much less, and displacing half as much space, may enable the U. S. to keep a merchant marine on the high seas. The new engine, which is being installed in 18 shipping board vessels, uses half as much fuel as an oil-burning steamer, reduces the engine-weight and requires a smaller crew. With it it is figured American ships would be able to compete profitably with foreign ships.
