ice Sunday night. A number were baptized Saturday afternoon, and will later be admitted to membership in their home churches.

The business sessions of the delegates from churches in the southern Oregon conference occupied considerable time during each day, and it was not until Sunday afternoon that the many perplexing matters that come before the assembly were finally disposed of. Probably the most important work was that of relocating the academy. This question was considered from every angle, and several sites visited by committees during the week. After going into the merits of these various locations, the question finally, by a process of elimination, was reduced to a choice between the Geo. Kruse ranch five miles west of Roseburg and the W. E. St. John estate a mile and a half east of Sutherlin. The latter property contains 42 acres, 20 acres of which are in full bearing commercial apples. This estate was, during the lifetime of its former owner known to Sutherlin people as Forest Lodge. St. John had spent a great deal of money in buildings, driveways, a private water system leading from springs back on the hill, and in bringing the orchard to a high state of production. This property was offered by Mark N. Tisdale, administrator of the estate, at appraised valuation.

The business interests of Sutherlin were keenly alive to the advantages of having the academy relocated near that town, and were determined to hold the institution in that vicinity if possible. The question was debated at length in committees and in the afternoon the problem presented to the entire delegation for a vote, and Sutherlin won by 25 votes.

As soon as the deeds have been made to the property and possession secured, the Adventist people will begin to improve the place in preparation for the opening of school in September. It will be necessary to erect a boys' dormitory and an administration building, as well as a building for class rooms, assembly hall and general school activities.

The St. John residence on the place will answer very nicely. It is slated for a girls' dormitory. The kitchen and dining rooms will have to be provided for in the new buildings.

Elder Rouse, the newly elected conference president, is expected to arrive from Washington this week, and the executive will then organize and get in working order to push the improvements and have everything in readiness for the fall term.

Forest Lodge, the new academy location is a picturesque spot on the southern slope of the hill overlooking the valley, and the place will make an ideal home for the denomination school to be built up there. The orchard will furnish opportunity for several of the young men students to work their way if they desire, and other industrial features will be inaugurated to give employment to students in other lines.

BOULOGNE, France, June 8.—The British balloon Elsie, participating in the Gordon Bennett cup race, was destroyed in landing today when its guide rope caught on a moving freight train, crashing the balloon on the tracks. The pilot was unhurt, but a passenger was slightly injured.

BRUSSELS, June 8.—One of the two American balloons entered in the Gordon Bennett cup race, the S-14, piloted by Lieutenants Flood and McCormick, landed safely this morning near Treporet, France. It was from Dieppe, France. Four other balloons, the Clamplino, Italian; Maroca, French; Duro, Spanish, and an unnamed balloon piloted by the Spanish captain Penaranda have also landed in France safely.

The start was made yesterday and it took five hours to get the great man hags away. The United States was also represented by the Goodyear III, piloted by Wade T. Van Orman. A message was received by carrier pigeon from Ernest De Muyter indicating that he is in difficulty. De Muyter, winner of the original Gordon Bennett balloon race trophy, is in the Bellica. The carrier pigeon brought a message which did not state his position but said "crossing channel will be impossible. Have already dumped 250 pounds of ballast in order to remain in the air."

The Spanish balloon Hespero Hespero Sunday fell in the North Sea. Pilot De La Rocha and Senor Lopez, a passenger, were rescued by a passing trawler. The balloon was lost.

ENGLAND-FRANCE PACT GUARANTEES SAFETY OF RHINE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
PARIS, June 8.—The Havas News Agency correspondent at Geneva says he is authorized to announce that in the treaty which Foreign Secretary Austen Chamberlain of Great Britain guarantees the security of the Rhine frontier as laid down in the Versailles peace treaty and will consider as a cause for war any violation of territorial clauses regarding the Rhineland. Great Britain offers to place at the disposal of France and Belgium in order to guarantee the security of the Rhine frontier in case of attack, the entire British military, naval and air forces. The guarantee does not extend to Germany's eastern frontiers between Poland and Czechoslovakia.
