WOOL GROWERS OF OREGON HOLD FOR PRICE OVER 35 CTS.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—Another big wool sale took place in Yakima yesterday, the largest of the season. Stanley Coffin disposed of 250,000 pounds of coarse wool at a price said to be in the neighborhood of 35 cents. The wool is stored in the western wool warehouse and will be shipped to Boston. Coffin still has approximately 200,000 pounds of fine wool still unsold.

Wool trading in Oregon is quiet as shearing progresses. Buyers have made offers as high as 35 cents, but growers are inclined to hold for a better market. The Boston wool market is somewhat more active and manufacturers are showing some interest in raw and prices are firmer on practically all domestic wool. Choice De Laines have sold up to 30 and 52 cents in the grease, f. o. b. Boston.

NEW LAURELWOOD PLAT IS APPROVED BY CITY COUNCIL

The plat of the new section of Laurelwood, soon to be thrown open, was presented to the city council last night in amended form and was adopted. The plat takes in the present athletic field and the grove, which will be divided into building lots. Petitions were submitted asking for the paving of Riverside Drive, Bowen street and Casey avenue, in the new section, and the engineer was instructed to prepare the necessary plans and specifications.

WEEK DAY BIBLE INSTRUCTION IN SCHOOLS PLANNED

A meeting is to be held at the City Hall tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock of the heads of all religious organizations of the city, for the purpose of considering the advisability of a week day Bible school. Under the present state law the school authorities are given permission to release the students in the public school from 120 minutes each week for the purpose of receiving religious instruction.

It is optional with the student whether or not this course is to be taken, and it is up to the religious organizations to provide the schools where such instruction may be obtained, unless the school district provides a course.

It has been suggested that a school be formed on a cooperative basis among the various religious bodies of the city, whereby a school may be formed, where students may be given instruction. Although this will be non-sectarian in nature, teaching fundamental religious truths, it will be possible, under the plan proposed, for parents, where they so desire, to have their children instructed in the particular teachings of their own religious beliefs.

The plan is to be discussed in greater detail at the meeting tomorrow night, the meeting having been arranged by Rev. H. J. Caldwell, president of the ministerial union of the city.

FILIPINO SAILORS ENLIST IN INSULAR COAST GUARD

MANILA, June 10.—With the organization and training of the officers and crews of the insular fleet of consigned cutters along military lines, approval of which has been given by Governor General Wood, Department Heads and Brigadier General Rafael Crame, chief of the consulars, are laying a

modest beginning for a future Philippine navy.

Brigadier General Crame, with the approval of the Secretary of the Interior Felipe Aguinaldo, recently authorized the transfer of arms and other military equipment for use of the coast guard sailors, the men having volunteered to furnish their own uniforms.

At present the coast guard force consists of 300 officers and men. Although the sailors are not required to perform military service, it is said all have volunteered to do this additional work both aboard ship and ashore.
