### CITY COUNCIL IN AGREEMENT TO TRADE LAND

(Continued from page 1.)

Mr. Creason owned what is now known as Kinney's addition, a mill race running to the old East mill bridge, the southern boundary of his line, and the north line of Mr. Cardwell's property.

As the city charter provides that any new addition must connect up with the extension of some street already established, it was necessary for Mr. Creason to secure a connection with Jackson street in order to open up his tract.

To do this he traded to Mr. Cardwell a strip of land north of the mill race, and south of what is now Second Avenue South, for a triangular shape strip, which now forms the intersection of Winchester and Jackson streets and the small triangular park.

Jackson street was laid out narrow to its intersection with Second Avenue South, and then widened out, and when it was paved, was paved in two strips, with wide parking space in the center.

The small triangular park in the intersection of Jackson and Winchester streets was decided to the city, and for many years has been the subject of beautification projects, but nothing has ever been done to improve it.

It is evident from the trend of conditions, that Second Avenue South is soon to be a main artery, bearing heavy traffic to and from the eastern part of the county. As the intersection is narrow there is bound to be more or less congestion, and a wider street is deemed advisable.

Recently a fire destroyed the building which formerly occupied the space between Jackson and Winchester streets, fronting on the unnamed street connecting those two north of the park. Mr. Creason now proposes, and has prepared plans, to construct a modern, permanent, reinforced concrete business block, at a cost of about \$40,000, and it was deemed advisable if a change is to be made in the street, to take action at once.

The members of the council made a thorough investigation, and it was believed that the street should be straightened and widened by procuring a twenty foot strip from Mr. Creason. He agreed to give the city this strip in exchange for the small park, and at the special meeting last night it was decided

to accept the proposition. The only string on the agreement is that the city shall not assess any paving costs on the newly acquired strip, to the abutting property.

Mr. Creason states that he has already started plans to beautify the small park, which he desired to acquire to protect his new building.

As this park is directly in front of the new structure which he proposes to erect, he states that it could have been used in such a manner as to cause him much damage in the future. He says that he does not expect to use the property for commercial purposes, or to allow it to be used as such, but expects to make it a garden spot, and has already given the contract for its improvement.

The city will probably do nothing to widen Jackson street at that point for the present time, but when conditions of traffic demand, the street can be straightened out, and a wide enough intersection provided to eliminate any congestion which may arise.
