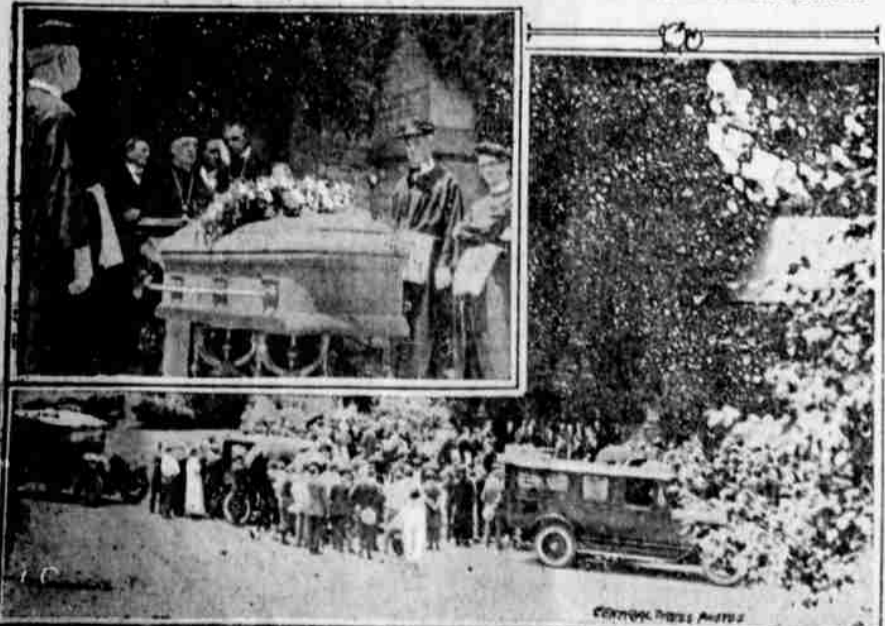

## MELROSE R. F. D. TO BE EXTENDED TO SERVE 20 FAMILIES

Authorization has been received by Postmaster Heinline to extend the Melrose mail route over the Callahan road for a distance of two and one-half miles to serve twenty more families. At the present time, in accordance with authority received about six months ago the mail carrier goes to Melrose and then continues to Elgarose, retracing to Cleveland hill and back by the river road. Under the new plan he will turn off to the left at the Cooper corner, and traverse the Callahan road as far as the Frank Dunn place. He will then retrace his way to the main road and follow his regular route. The route will serve approximately twenty families.

Those served by the route will be required to provide standard mail boxes, with their names clearly painted on one side and erected on substantial posts or supports. The new service will start on June 15.

## LUMBER BUSINESS SHOWS INCREASE 12 PER CENT.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—After a period of comparative quiet, the lumber industry has taken a decided upward trend. Figures for last week compiled by the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association show new business amounting to 12 per cent increase over the week preceding and 35 per cent over the corresponding week of 1924. New business has been propor-

tionally larger than last year for several weeks and the cumulative total since the first of the year now exceeds that for the same period of last year by a full weeks production.

## SPIRIT OF PAST ANIMATES JACKSONVILLE'S GOLD PLEA

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) MEDFORD, Ore., June 11.—At a meeting of the Jacksonville city council last night a resolution was passed urging all the citizens of that place and the entire county to put all the gold they can into circulation, withdraw paper currency and thus help out the gold miners and the gold industry. Copies of the resolution will be sent to all municipalities in Oregon and to the larger cities of the United States. Jacksonville was the largest gold mining camp in Oregon 70 years ago, but is now a place of only a few hundred inhabitants although many gold prospects there are still being worked from time to time.

## McMILLAN GETS FREE HAND.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, June 11.—The MacMillan expedition when it departs for the Arctic June 17, Secretary Wilbur said today, will carry no special instructions concerning the crop it should pursue in claiming any lands which may be discovered or in flying over disputed territory.

## NATIONAL FRUIT CROP OUTLOOK IS POOR, REPORT SAYS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, June 11.—The present outlook for fruit crops is rather unfavorable, the department of agriculture crop officials declared today. The condition of apples on June 1 was nearly ten per cent below the usual average on that date, they said.

"Frost in late May," a statement said, "reduced prospects in many scattered localities. Northwestern states expect more apples than were picked last year, but for the country as a whole the crop does not seem likely to be as large. Peach production shows a large increase in California, where most of the crop is canned or dried, but in practically all other important states the crop is expected to be substantially smaller than last year. The pear crop also is only fair, California being the only important producing state which expects a materially larger crop than was harvested last year."

## ACTRESS ASKS \$200,000 FOR ALLEGED SLANDER

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, June 11.—A secret dossier of the French government figures in the trial here of a \$200,000 slander suit brought against five defendants by Mrs. Marion McAllister Smith, formerly Mercedes Leigh, the first actress to play "Salome" in the United States. The dossier purported to identify Mrs. Smith as a notorious duchess De Vallenda, who was imprisoned in France in 1906 for embezzlement. Mrs. Smith alleges that the defendants libeled her circulating the report. The defendants are Mme. Anne E. Guerin, former American representative of Mme. Millerand, wife of the former French president; George N. Burleigh, an attorney; Barry N. Smith, of the National Information Bureau; Bronson Bachelor, Inc., a public agency, and Roger B. Jenkins, an officer of the corporation.

KLAMATH FALLS Ore., June 11.—Henry Burke, Klamath Falls welterweight champion, wrestler, tossed Pete Busukos, former world's welterweight champion, in two straight falls here last night. The men were separated to prevent a fatal argument just before they went on the mat. Burke took the first fall in nine minutes with a punishing toe hold, and won the second fall in seven minutes with a double a-c lock.

## NEW MILL BUILDING TO BE COMPLETED NEXT WEEK

The reinforced concrete building being constructed for the Douglas County Flour Mills, will be completed the first part of next week, it was announced today. Work has been rushed on this structure and it is being finished in record time. Installation of the new equipment and machinery will be started at once, and will probably take two months, as the machinery for feed mixing will be more than double the capacity of the plant. The mill was already equipped sufficiently

to meet the demands for flour, with an ample surplus for future development. Some new machinery will be installed in that department to increase speed and efficiency and to bring the mill up to the minute. The feed department, however, is to be greatly increased and will have ample capacity to supply all of the southern part of the state.
