Universities and colleges has been obtained in questionnaire distributed throughout the council. When accord has been reached finally by the assembly, the results will be put in a definite statement and upon this declaration will be based the action to be taken at the eighth triennial general convention of the church to be held at New Orleans, October 7.

The students were asked to express their views on such problems as: "Should one's thinking in religion be organized into creedal form?" "How do the teachings of the church harmonize with the established results of modern science?" "What may a student expect from the church, and why?" "Is a working knowledge of the Bible necessary to a proper practice of Christianity?" and "What effect has college had upon your religion, and why?"

Answers to these questions and a score of others equally pertinent have been received in surprising volume.

The assembly will be divided into eight discussion groups, the personnel of which will change each day so that a student will discuss a portion of the problems in the questionnaire with different students from all over the country. Later a forum of the entire conference will hear reports from the discussion groups, accept or reject their decision, and shape the policy of the student work of the council in all of the institutions represented for the next triennium.

OLD WATCH REVIVES TALES OF NEVADA'S FRONTIER DAYS

RENO, Nev., June 10.—Horace Greeley's memorable ride in a stage coach, driven by Hank Monk when the "father of journalism" visited this section of Nevada in the early sixties, was recalled recently when a gift watch of Monk's was brought to a local jewelry store for repair. The old timepiece, presented to the noted Nevada stage coach driver in 1863, has works of English manufacture and the case, of 18 karat gold weighing 81 ounces, was made by S. S. Shreve in San Francisco.

The watch bears this inscription: "Presented to Hank Monk as a testimonial of the appreciation of his friends for his skill and carefulness as a whip."

"W. Thompson, Jr., Joe Clark, H. B. Wakelee, J. O. Earl, W. W. Stone, Alex O'Neal, John E. Hennings, W. M. Lent, George Hearst, H. H. Raymond."

"Keep your seat, Mr. Greeley! I'll have you there, December 1, 1863."

The George Hearst listed among the donors was the father of the publisher, William R. and Randolph Hearst.

"OI, YOI" JACOB HAS ONE NICER THAN "EILI, EILI!"

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, June 11.—Jacob Koppell Sandler, who has lost a suit to establish himself as author of the famous Jewish lament, "EILI, EILI," has a new song which he says will be his vindication before the world and will surpass "EILI, EILI" in beauty.

Federal Judge John C. Knox, yesterday held Sandler had not proved his case against a publisher charging infringement of his copyright. The court pointed out that 25 years elapsed between the time Sandler says he wrote the song and the date of his copyright. He had it copyrighted in 1919 after Sophie Bresslau had sung it to great acclaim at the Metropolitan Opera House.

Sandler set forth that the song was worth at least \$500,000 and that he had received only \$76. He is 66 years old.

ARTISTS OF SOUTH AMERICA TO EXHIBIT AT LOS ANGELES.

LOS ANGELES, June 11.—Five hundred oil paintings and etchings by leading contemporary artists of North, Central and South America will be brought together here for a three-months display when the Pan-American Exhibition opens November 2, this year, at the Los Angeles Museum.

The exhibition, in which paintings by artists from Canada and the United States of North America, Mexico and Panama of Central America, and Brazil, Argentina, Peru and Chile of South America, will be exhibited, will mark the first representation in this country since 1915 of the southern continent's art. Argentina, in 1915, entered a remarkable exhibit in the Panama Pacific International Exposition at San Francisco.

Paintings by Diego Rivera, of Mexico, considered by art critics as one of the greatest living artists of the world, and also a Mexican painter, and Manuel Vago, a Cuban, one of the younger Havana painters, will be exhibited.

A few portraits by the late John Singer Sargent, American artist, will be part of the exhibition.

Other prominent North American artists whose canvases will be shown are Frederick Carl Frieseke, Karl Anderson, John E. Coatsworth, Mary Cassatt, John F. Carlson, T. W. Dewing, Daniel Garber, John R. Grabach, Robert Henri, John C. Johnson, Leon Kroll, Ernest Lawson and Elmer Schofield.

Immediately following the close of the exhibition here, January 1, 1926, the Latin American section will start on a tour of the important museums of the United States, and the North American section will be sent to the capitals of Latin America.

Honorio Pueyrredon, ambassador to the United States from Argentina, has accepted an invitation to speak at the opening of the exhibition.

quently to be seen in Italy as they are in America.

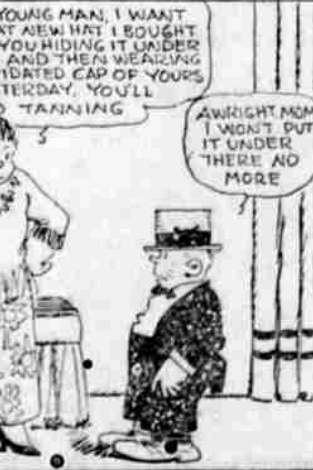

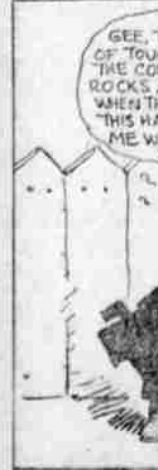
