MEDFORD GREET OREGON NATIONAL GUARD COMPANIES

The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce has received a letter from the secretary of the Medford Chamber of Commerce, announcing the arrival of the Roseburg unit of the Oregon National Guard. "Your boys, whom the writer greeted on arrival, most certainly look fit, and of sufficient importance for the city of Roseburg to be exceptionally proud," Robert H. Boyd, secretary of the Medford Chamber writes. "We are mighty happy," he continues, "to have them with us and we want your Chamber and the citizens of Roseburg to know that the Medford Chamber of Commerce has left nothing undone to make their visit here happy, pleasant and long to be remembered. All of the churches have planned elaborate religious program and social functions. Medford homes have been thrown wide open to them, all and every kind of wholesome entertainment has been provided for their pleasure, and it is all free. "Probably the most spectacular of our entire program is this: we have assembled 600 automobiles and the entire guard, numbering close to 3,000, will leave Camp Jackson at 5 a. m. WHITMAN COLLEGE PREXY PROTESTS SHUT-IN ROUTINE

WALLA WALLA Wash., June 13.—Dr. Stephen B. L. Penrose, for 31 years president of Whitman College, in his annual report to the board of overseers here today, tendered his resignation as president of the college, in order that the board might be able to freely choose between three alternative solutions of the situation, which has developed because of the impairment of his vision early in the school year, which is now closing. "While I am able to carry on my class work and the internal administration of college affairs, I am not able to carry on the work of cultivating relations with the outer world, an equally indispensable part of a president's duties," said the Penrose report. "Three solutions of the situation present themselves to my mind," continued the report. "The first is that you should elect a president to take my place, who would carry on the joint duties which I have been carrying for the past 31 years, and give his attention to both the inner and outer sides of college administration; second, a president who will devote himself to the external administration and leave me, if you wished to do so, as instructor in philosophy; the third is that I should continue as president to carry on my work of teaching and internal administration as I have done this year and that an assistant to the president should be appointed, whose duty it would be to cultivate under my direction those persons in the outside world whose friendships for the college will be particularly valuable." SPEAKER TELLS PLANS TO MAKE LAW EFFECTIVE

Flying Squadron Foundation Proposes Changes in Present System.

SHIFT IS FAVORED

Would Transfer Enforcement Unit From Treasury Bureau to Department of Justice.

The plans of the Flying Squadron Foundation for procuring more efficient enforcement of the prohibition laws in the future were emphasized last night by Hon. Oliver Wayne Stewart, nationally known lecturer, in a meeting and conference at the Baptist church. Mr. Stewart in concluding the law enforcement conference took up the plans which are now being advanced, and which are hoped to be more effective in meeting the situation.

The question of maintaining law and order involves all of civilization, the speaker stated. When law and order fall, civilization is overthrown and therefore it is important that every citizen who believes the government is worth saving should do his part to preserve the law.

One of the plans which the Flying Squadron Foundation has to meet the conditions at present is to install a legislative bureau in Washington, D. C. to strive to put into execution the changes which the organization proposes. The principal change favored is the transfer of the prohibition unit from the treasury department to the department of justice.

The prohibition enforcement work was put under the treasury department because that branch of the government had already built up a force and certain rules and regulations governing the revenue from the liquor traffic, which with some alteration could be used for enforcement. This has turned out, however, to be a mistake, as the work should be under the department of justice, which is empowered to enforce the laws of the country. By an act of congress the service established by the treasury department could be transferred to the department where the machinery for handling the work more efficiently has already been created.

Another proposition which the legislative bureau would take up, would be the making of a jail sentence mandatory in all first offense cases. The bootlegger is in the business for graft and greed, and a fine is no punishment. It is a jail sentence that he fears, and the fact that a jail sentence would be imposed in first offense cases would be a decided deterrent. The organization also proposes the deportation of all aliens found guilty of law violations. Aliens, the speaker stated, are guests of the country, and it is the guest's duty to behave and follow the laws of the country or leave. If he fails to keep within the laws he should be required to leave. The speaker made it plain that the organization has nothing against the bootlegger himself as long as he behaves himself in this country. But if he is not an aid in uplift, or on the other hand tries to tear down the government, he should be deported at once.

The organization also proposes to keep the Flying Squadron in the field indefinitely keeping up the work of stimulating interest in law enforcement, and also to maintain a weekly paper to spread the propaganda of law enforcement throughout the country.

The meeting last night was attended by a fair-sized crowd, and was conducted by Rev. H. E. Mow. NEGRO ATHLETE IS WORLD LEADER FOR RUNNING BROAD JUMP

STAGG FIELD, Chicago, June 12.—De Hart Hubbard, University of Michigan's famous negro athlete, smashed the world's record for the running broad jump by four and nine-sixteenths inches in the national collegiate track and field championship meet on Stagg Field today. Hubbard, making his final interstate collegiate appearance, jumped 25 feet 19 7/8 inches. Hubbard's remarkable jump beat the world's record of 25 feet 5 1/2 inches made by R. L. Legendre of Georgetown University, competing in the Olympic games in Paris last summer. It was the month time that Hubbard had cleared 25 feet, a performance heretofore made only three times by two other athletes.
