## UNUSUAL CASE IN JUSTICE COURT

An unusual case was heard in the local justice court today, being still in progress at a late hour this afternoon.

Irving and Vernon Davis and Ben Batey were accused of fishing unlawfully at Winchester. They were instructed by an officer to appear in the Roseburg justice court for a hearing, it is alleged by the state, but instead of coming to Roseburg before Justice of the Peace George Jones, they went to Wilbur, admitting their guilt in that court and paid fines of \$25 each. The minimum fine in such cases, the state contends, is \$50.

A complaint against them was filed in the local justice court and they were brought to trial this morning. They set up a defense they had already been convicted on the charge in another court, and that they could not be placed in jeopardy for the same offense.

The state held that the action of the Wilbur court was not binding inasmuch as the defendants had not right to disavow the court in which the case was to be tried, and that the state had filed no complaint against them in that court. After hearing authorities quoted by both sides, Judge Jones ruled in favor of the state, holding that the men had not been convicted at Wilbur. The case was then tried upon the evidence.

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## TWISTED WRECK OF PASSENGER BURIES SCORES

Lackawanna railroad officials said three had been killed and seventy injured. In this report it was said that lightning struck one of the rails throwing it out of place, that a landslide due to the severe storm had covered the rails and that the track also had been undermined.

## EASTON, Pa., June 16.—At least a dozen persons were killed and 30 others injured today when a Delaware Lackawanna and Western train from the west for Hoboken, N. J., was wrecked at Rockport, near Hackettstown, N. J.

Many of the injured were brought to the Easton hospital. The accident occurred during an electrical storm. Seven of the ten cars of the train left the tracks, and because of the manner in which the roadbed was torn up, it was impossible for hours to determine what might have been the cause. Both engineer and fireman were killed. The 185 passengers on the train were to have sailed today from Hoboken for European countries. The first coach was hurled half way over the top of the overturned locomotive. Men and women fought madly to work their way out of coaches. The locomotive blew up and filled the air with steam. Passengers said they were unable to see more than a foot in front of them. W. J. Kenny, city passenger agent for the Lackawanna at Buffalo, was scalded on both arms, his face and one leg. He is in the Easton hospital. Leopold Neumann, a Chicago

## steamship agent who arranged the excursion, was uninjured.
