## CANNERY RUNNING ON LOGANBERRIES AND CHERRIES THIS WEEK

The Roseburg cannery is working part time this week on cherries, and next week expects to start full blast for a three weeks' run on cherries and loganberries. The cherry crop this year was very light and the cannery's pack will be much shorter than in previous years. Loganberries are plentiful and it is expected that it will require fully three weeks to handle the crop. After they are disposed of the cannery will have a few short runs on blackberries and will then be closed down until August when the fruit season will start with pears, running through steadily until the last of the year on prunes and apples.

## WEATHER FAVORABLE TO GRAIN IS REPORT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, June 17.—The weather has been generally favorable for small grain, except that hail did some local damage, and there was some injury by frost in elevated districts says the weekly Oregon crop report, issued here today by the weather bureau. Winter barley and wheat are ripening slowly. Most fruits need warmer weather. Raspberries and cherries are in market in small quantities. Strawberries are nearly gone in some places, but are still plentiful in others. Later fruits are sizing well.

The first cutting of alfalfa is in the stack in the milder localities, and the second crop is starting well, but needs warmer weather. Early potatoes are in market in increasing quantities; planting of late potatoes continues. Some damage was done by frost to potatoes and gardens in elevated districts, and in a few northeastern localities some hail damage was reported. Gardens need warmer weather. Hops are doing well. Flax is making good growth.

## TWO ENTRANCES TO CRATER LAKE PARK TO BE PAVED SOON

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 17.—Paving of both entrances to Crater Lake National Park will start July 1, according to announcement made here today by William E. Arnold, superintendent of the Warren Construction company, whose firm was awarded the contract. The work will approximate 20 miles and will cost in the neighborhood of \$200,000.

Park officials will provide good detours for auto tourists during the time the paving is in progress and these will be only for short stretches. Improvement of both the Klamath Falls and Medford entrances will proceed simultaneously, the paving official announced.
