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STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION ON WAY TO COAST

Commissioners and Officials With Portland Men View Projects.

NEW WORK PLANNED

More Contracts to Be Let On Southern End of Roosevelt Highway, Say Officials.

Members of the state highway commission and other highway officials, together with a party of prominent Portland men, left Roseburg this morning on an inspection trip over the Roseburg-Coos Bay and the Roosevelt highway.

Wm. Daby, chairman of the state highway commission, and H. B. Van Duzer, commissioner, together with Roy Klein, state highway engineer and W. A. Chandler, division engineer, arrived in Roseburg last night, and spent the night at the Umpqua Hotel. This morning they met a large Portland delegation composed of Edgar B. Piper, editor of the Morning Oregonian, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Irvine, of the Oregon Journal, and L. R. Wheeler of the Portland Telegram; J. C. Almsworth, president of the U. S. National Bank, Roderick Macleay, president of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, and Bill Hanley, of Burns, one of the state's best known road boosters.

W. H. Malone, also of the state highway commission, is to join the party later.

Automobiles were provided for the party and they left shortly after the arrival of the morning train for Marshfield, over the Coos Bay highway. The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce will provide entertainment tonight. It

NEW OUTBREAK INCREASE GRAVE CHINA PROBLEM

Wharf Strike Endangers All Ocean-Going Steamer Trade.

POSTERS EXCITE MOB

Chinese Newspapers Say Fires Due to Combustion, Death of Englishman to Sickness.

SHANGHAI, June 18.—The ship-ping strike, became more serious today when coolies and lighter men struck at the Footing wharf. It was feared tugs and launches working in connection with ocean-going steamers will soon become involved. Ninety former Chinese municipal policemen led a huge procession yesterday, breaking shop windows that contained Japanese or British goods. Late yesterday afternoon strikers set fire to a Japanese-owned cotton mill, but police extinguished the flames before much damage was done.

The procession led by the former police yesterday, was finally subdued by the Manchurian troops of General Chang Hsueh-Liang, son of General Chang Tso-Lin the Manchurian war lord.

These troops recently reached Shanghai from Nanking.

Activities of extremists in Chinese territory adjoining the Shanghai foreign settlements, increased. Dispatches from Kiu-Kiang, where the British and Japanese consulates recently were attacked and the British concession invaded, reported a gradual improvement in the situation there.

Reports from Hankow said quiet prevailed and that the number of foreign guards had been reduced, although a strong emergency force still was maintained.

Chinese students, harangued crowds in the native city and tore down advertisements of British and Japanese goods.

Delegates from the leaders of yesterday's demonstration against stores displaying wares of British and Japanese make, sent delegates to ask General Chang Hsueh-Liang to throw in his lot with the general Chinese-strike movement. He replied counseling "prudence and patience".

PEKING, June 18.—Thousands of posters have appeared in Peking depicting British policemen shooting and bayonetting students, women and children with bodies lying on the ground.

The vernacular newspapers print accounts, differing materially from the foreign versions of affairs at Shanghai, Hankow and elsewhere. Some of these stories assert that the Hankow trouble was entirely a fight between factions of Japanese, that the foreign buildings in Kiu-Kiang burned from spontaneous combustion and that W. W. Mackenzie, the British subject murdered at Shanghai, died of sickness.

The native accounts of the Mackenzie incident say the British consul ordered the doctor who attended him to mutilate the body in an effort to throw the blame on the Chinese.

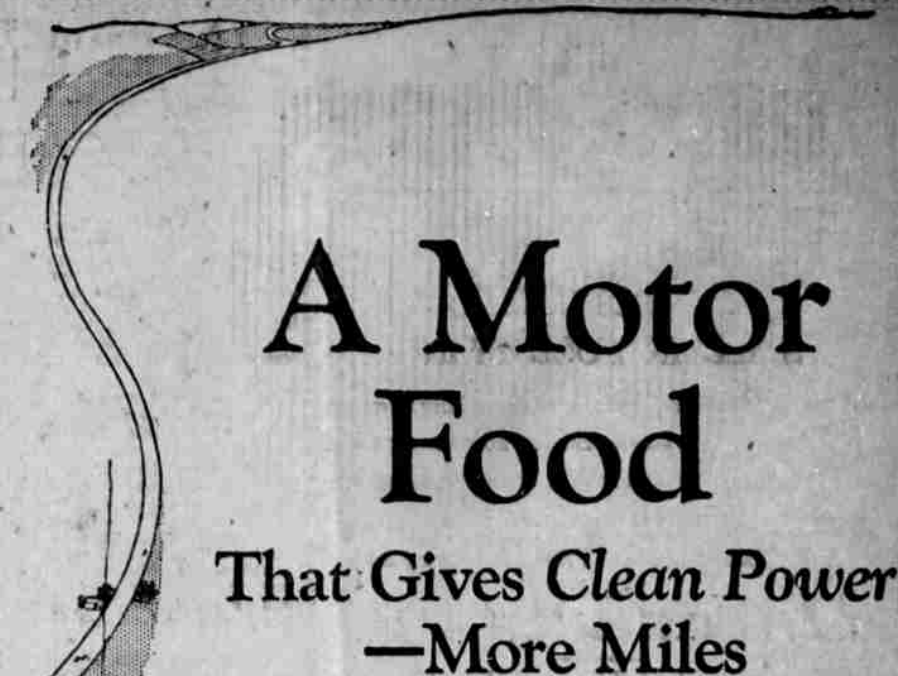

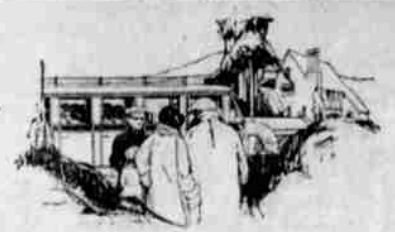
