MUST SHOW TITLE UNDER NEW LAW TO GET LICENSE

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.) SALEM, Ore., June 19.—In a letter sent out by Secretary of State Koser to sheriffs and other peace officers of the state, he stated that after July 1, no automobile registration will be granted a motor vehicle license, unless the owner shall, at the same time that he applies for a license plate, make application for a certificate of title to his vehicle or show that such application has already been made. This is under the law passed by the 1925 session of the legislature whereby all motor vehicle owners must file certificates of title with the secretary of state.

CHANGE MADE IN HANDLING C. O. D. PARCEL POST MATTER

New postal regulations require that after August 1 all shippers of insured or C. O. D. parcels guarantee postage both ways, according to what received by C. S. Heilmeier, Roseburg postmaster. In explaining this new regulation, the postmaster states that in sending insured packages it will be necessary for the sender to indicate whether the package is to be forwarded or not as in case it is returned from the forwarding address the return postage for the additional distance will be required. The new regulations also provide that senders who do not desire the return of mail when the addressee cannot be found, may indicate the department to abandon the package and in that way avoid the payment of return postage.

UMPUQA TIMBER TO GO UNDER THE AXE

EUGENE, Ore., June 18.—According to reports from Cottage Grove, the Anderson and Middleton company will commence within the next six or eight months to saw out its timber in the Umpqua district on a contract with the national forest service, which requires the cutting of 40,000,000 feet yearly. Operations will be in the area set aside for an experiment in sustained yield over a period of 100 years.

In addition to the government timber cutting license, the Anderson and Middleton company will operate on its own timber to keep the saw going at the company's two mills, which have been rebuilt to modern standard. The company's logging railway is being extended into the timber west of Cottage Grove, and additional equipment has been ordered.

DARING MOTORISTS INVITED TO HUDSON BAY TERRITORY WINNIPEG, Man., June 18.—A procession of tourists driving into the picturesque northland on their own family motor cars, fitted with flanged rims to grip the rails of the Hudson Bay line, is the ingenious scheme proposed by R. M. Haultain, a railway construction engineer of Winnipeg. Mr. Haultain believes that such traffic will present no difficulties, to obviate any danger of accidents, he would placard the line to the effect that the odd days of the month would be reserved for north-bound traffic and the even days for southbound. Each car would be required to carry a light derailing shoe, to provide for emergencies. The investment on the part of rims, trailers, steering gear, levers, etc., would be negligible, declared Mr. Haultain, when compared with the increased revenue obtained from freight cars to different points along the Hudson Bay line. Mr. Haultain has complete confidence in the feasibility of the scheme and maintains that the north country would ultimately become the mecca of sport lovers and attract tourists to the profitable advantage of the local railroads.
