Today's initial session comprised largely of prayer and tributes to their former comrades—a prayer and tribute that was signified by a period of silence during which there was a simultaneous placing of D. A. V. wreaths upon the tombs of the "Unknown Soldier" at Arlington, Rome, London, Paris and Brussels.

DR. STEWART HOME.

Dr. E. B. Stewart, a member of the national executive committee of the American Legion, representing the department of Oregon, returned to his home in this city last night after attending the meeting of the board in Indianapolis. He reports that he encountered very hot weather on the trip and is glad to return to Oregon. While in Indianapolis, he had the pleasure of being one of those who participated in the dedication of the first unit of the memorial being built by the state of Indiana and the City of Indianapolis. The memorial will cover several blocks, and will cost, when completed, \$15,000,000. It is in the form of beautiful buildings to be used for public purposes, the first unit being the new national home of the American Legion. It was presented by the governor of the state, and accepted by the national American Legion command.

SLAMS AMERICA'S ALIEN TEST METHODS. PORTLAND, June 22.—Certain Americanization methods in the United States were criticized by Dr. Alexander Goldenweiser, of New York school of social research, member of the University of Oregon summer school faculty in his talk before the opening session of Oregon Social Workers' Association in conference here today.
