STATE AUTO LICENSE LAWS ARE EXPLAINED

Secretary of State Gives Instructions to Various County Sheriffs

REQUIRE CERTIFICATE

Owners of Cars Must Secure Certificate of Title From Secretary of State—Blanks Prepared

Registration of any vehicle, or number plates therefor, whether original issues, or duplicates, shall be issued or furnished by the secretary of state of Oregon, unless the applicant therefor shall at the same time he applies for a motor vehicle license for any car, make application for and be granted an official certificate of title of a motor vehicle, or shall present satisfactory evidence that such a certificate, covering such motor vehicle, has been previously issued to the applicant." Section 3 of said Chapter 259, relates to transfers of motor vehicles on and after July first, and provides that no transfer can be made of a motor vehicle licensed prior to July first, 1925, except a certificate of title has first been applied for and issued as prescribed in section 2 of said Chapter 259.

It is suggested that you direct the attention of all motor vehicle owners, who may apply through the sheriffs of the counties to the secretary of state for licenses from and after the date of the receipt of this letter by you, to the certificate of title law, that is said Chapter 259, Laws 1925, and advise that notwithstanding they may submit their applications through the sheriffs or direct to the secretary of state, they must apply concurrently therewith for a certificate of title, and that the license cannot be issued to them by the secretary of state until they have given that official satisfactory evidence of ownership and have been issued a certificate of title by that official. Forms for the convenience of motor vehicle owners in applying for certificates of title are now being prepared by the secretary of state and will be furnished to motor vehicle owners upon request.

The subject matter of this letter is of great importance to every motor vehicle owner who may desire a motor vehicle license on or after July first, and you are therefore especially urged to bring their attention to the provisions of the certificate of title law (Chapter 259, Laws 1925). For the convenience of all motor vehicle owners who have registered their cars prior to this date, or who may register their cars and receive their licenses before July first, applications for certificates of title will be mailed them within the next few weeks.

The certificate of title law requires that the owner of every motor vehicle, whether or not the car has been registered and licensed before July first, shall immediately apply for a certificate of title and furnish the secretary of state satisfactory evidence of ownership before such certificate of title can be issued by the secretary of state.

TAG DAY FOR WHALES IN ARCTIC OCEAN

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., June 22.—(A. P.)—An expedition which is tagging whales with identity discs, and take other steps to discover more about their habits and habits, will set out from this port in June for the Antarctic regions to remain for many months while engaged in research work. The scientists hope to determine, among many other things, whether whales are polygamous; their birth rate; how long they live; how far and where they travel, and what floating organisms constitute their food.

To learn whether whales breeding in African waters migrate to southern seas to feed, small darts bearing metal labels will be fired from a specially designed cannon into the thick layer of blubber on the back. These tags are all numbered, and a record of each one kept in the event that any of these darts are subsequently found by whalers or other persons. It is hoped that the expedition leaders will be communicated with, as each label contains a request as to where the whale was caught and under what conditions.

The expedition will probably make its base at the Falkland Islands. It is under the auspices of the colonial office, and its task is designed to end the whaling industry.

Captain Scott's old ship, the Discovery, will be used by the scientists, and Lieutenant J. H. Stenhouse, who has had much experience in chasing whales, will be the vessel's master.

CALGARY ASKS THE WORLD TO ITS 50TH ANNIVERSARY

CALGARY, Alta., June 21.—Preparations are proceeding apace for the Calgary Jubilee stampede to be staged in July.

The city will be given over to the populace and visitors during the period of celebration, for no restricted merriment. Once more the dusty chuck wagons will come tearing down the streets distributing flap-jacks to the crowds; once more will Indians be strolling through the avenues of a modern city, where but half a century ago their forebears whooped and hunted buffalo over what was then a bare prairie. Furthermore the Mounted Police will be here in full force and glory, to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of their coming to Calgary.

According to the stampede promoters, the outdoor west is going to be seen in its romantic glory. It is going to be wild, woolly, western and wholesome. It is going to be educational, interesting, historical and invigorating. The pioneer past will be depicted in contrast to the progressive present.

A mammoth parade will be staged, the program to include Indians, cowboys and girls, mounted police, trappers, a cavalcade of western horsemen, and floats representing the development of the district.

The stampede will not be conducted as a show, but as a genuine competitive tournament, with valuable prizes, trophies and official championship titles at stake.

Last year's stampede attracted a total gate of 167,275 compared with 97,732 in 1922.

CONVICTED MAN, STABBED BY HIS ABETTOR, IS DEAD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

CHICAGO, June 22.—Bernard Grant, fearful of the hangman's noose in spite of the efforts of thousands of persons throughout the country who had signed petitions urging clemency of Governor Len Small, refused today to permit physicians to perform an operation in the hope of saving his life, and died 30 minutes later. He was stabbed five times Saturday by Walter Krauser once sentenced with Grant to hang, but later granted a new trial.

Grant was very weak from the wounds in his neck and chest and physicians at the House of Correction hospital insisted on a blood transfusion.

"I'll be dead in a little while if you'll let me alone," said the wounded prisoner, "so why prolong my life when it's going to be taken from me anyway."

Dr. Frank Jirka pleaded, but Grant's resistance did not weaken. A half hour later the prisoner died.

Grant, who always insisted he was innocent, and that Krauser alone was guilty of the killing of Policeman Ralph Saunders in a holding in 1922, probably would have been pardoned or his sentence commuted to life imprisonment had Krauser escaped the gallows at his second trial, which was set recently for this week. The supreme court had allowed Krauser a retrial, but denied a second hearing for Grant.

FRENCH OFFICER BLOWS UP FORT TO ESCAPE RIFFIANS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PARIS, June 22.—A dispatch from Fez, French Morocco, says that Second Lieutenant Lafevre, with six Senegalese soldiers, the only survivors of his original garrison of 22 men, blew up his blockhouse on June 14 rather than be taken alive or surrender to the besieging Riffians of Abd-El-Krim's forces.

He had held the post for eight days against the tribesmen. His two cannons had fired away incessantly.

He had steadily asked for help, but no rescue party had arrived.
