**NORTH ROSEBURG
HOME COMPLETELY
DESTROYED BY FIRE**

The house, which until yesterday was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Benner, located at the corner of East First Avenue North and East 4th street, was completely destroyed by fire last night. Mr. and Mrs. Benner left yesterday afternoon for Portland, and the fire was discovered about 3 o'clock this morning, the whole interior being afire at that time. It is presumed that the fire started from an oil stove in the kitchen, or possibly from the burning of trash in the kitchen range, evidence showing that the fire started in the kitchen, and was drawn to the center of the house by the draft up the fireplace chimney.

There was a great deal of delay in getting the alarm turned in to the fire department, and after the blaze was first discovered, it was reported, and owing to the fact that there was a break in the alarm bell connections the firemen answered the wrong telephone causing another short delay.

By the time the water was turned on, the house was so far gone that nothing could be done to save it, and practically all efforts were devoted to saving the adjoining houses of T. D. Roland and Earl Burr, which were endangered by falling embers.

The big pumper demonstrated its value, delivering a strong nozzle pressure through more than eight hundred feet of hose.

The loss which will amount to approximately \$5,000 was partially covered by insurance.

**PRESIDENT READY
FOR VACATION AT
SUMMER CAPITOL**

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Only a cabinet meeting, perhaps the last to be held this summer, stood today between President Coolidge and his vacation.

With his departure for the summer White House at Swampscott, Mass., set for early afternoon, Mr. Coolidge devoted the morning to a last minute check-up with his cabinet and to arranging for a transfer of the major business of his office.

Practically every important pending question has been disposed of by Mr. Coolidge today, although a few appointments remain to be made and he still has under consideration some reports from the tariff commission, recommending changes in duties. An office has been set up for the president in Lynn, Mass., and with part of the executive force there, including Secretary Sanders, he will carry on such business there as arises during the summer.

Reports of harm done to wheat by hail and cloudbursts received yesterday from a usually reliable source could not be verified today and apparently the heavy fall of rain did a great deal more good to the growing wheat than harm. A thorough check-up on supposed hail damage failed to substantiate the reports of yesterday. Some livestock was lost in the flooding of gullies, including between four and five hundred young turkeys on the Dave Boyd place.

BLAZE DESTROYS PRINEVILLE PAPER

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
BEND, Ore., June 23.—Fire at 2 o'clock this morning almost completely destroyed the plant of the Central Oregonian, weekly newspaper at Prineville. The loss is estimated at between \$5,000 and \$6,000 by R. H. Jonas editor and publisher. Stock estimated at between \$1,500 and \$2,000 was destroyed together with three presses. The machinery and stock was covered by insurance. Water poured on machinery when it was hot was responsible for most of the damage there, according to Jonas. The fire started either under the building or between the one occupied by the newspaper and the adjoining building, it is thought. It was discovered by Miss Elsie Augustine, telephone operator just before 2 o'clock this morning.

DESKUTES FIRES ARE STILL BURNING

BEND, Ore., June 23.—Five fires in the Deschutes national forest were still burning this morning. One of these on Snow creek, was first reported late yesterday. None are serious, according to local forestry officers. Weather conditions continue harsh, officials said this morning, with the relative humidity falling despite lower temperatures. A temporary outlook has been sent to Fox Butte while the regular will be there within a few days.
