RECOVERY OF EUROPE MATERIALLY HELPED BY GOLD STANDARDS

GENEVA, June 22.—Albert Thomas, director of the international labor office, told the delegates of 40 countries here for the international labor conference that the year 1924 marked the beginning of the re-establishment of normal economic conditions. He attributes the economic improvement to the patient work carried out by every country since the cessation of hostilities to remedy the direct or indirect consequences of the war. He paid high tribute to the Dawes report, and emphasized that a special place must be given to direct intervention of the League of Nations in the financial reconstruction of Austria. The speaker underlined the significance of the fact that immediately after league action the Austrian crown, whose headlines fall nothing seemed able to check, became as stable as the dollar.

"This Austrian achievement," said M. Thomas, "was the starting point of similar reforms in other countries and was a great lesson to Europe, followed by a return to the gold standard in Russia, Germany, Poland, and Hungary, whose monetary situation before had been desperate.

"These remarkable results have not been sufficiently brought out. When the League of Nations stabilized the Austrian dollar at the rate of 21 crowns a day. When Poland stabilized its mark, the dollar was rising in Warsaw at the rate of 65 Polish marks a minute. When Russia established the chervonets, which is ten gold rubles, the dollar was rising in Petrograd at the rate of 18,000 rubles a second. When Germany stabilized the mark by creating the Rentenmark, the dollar was going up in Berlin by 613.000 marks a second."

M. Thomas emphasized also the parity of the return to gold currencies, the Canadian dollar, the Mexican peso and the Indian rupee, and of neutral countries in Europe, Sweden, Holland and Switzerland.

"Glancing towards the United States," said M. Thomas, "I find a change in the American economic position which has steadily improved since the war in comparison with the European situation. There are some satisfying systems which seem to indicate new tendencies towards readjustment, for there is a leveling up of relations between the New World and Europe."

He emphasized that what has been progressing since 1924 is not so much world output as European output, for European output, he said, was much more on a scale equal to American production than in previous years.

There was the speaker concluded, a falling off in American production in cast iron, steel, and shipping. All this was good, he argued, for it indicated a return to normal relations between Europe and America, and consequently the return of the world to economic stability.

MYTHICAL TREASURE LURES 7 SAILORMEN TO ADVENTURE

SAN PEDRO, Cal., June 22.—A lone tale of sea was unfolded by seven members of a treasure-hunting expedition that arrived here recently in the purse-seiner Balboa after an unsuccessful search for \$1,500,000 in gold bullion that was aboard the old Pacific Mail side-wheeler Golden Gate which burned and sank off Manzanillo, Mexico, in 1862.

The Balboa, which left here May 2, returned May 27, battered from severe buffeting by wind and tide. Several months ago C. G. Curry, a railway conductor of Leavenworth, Kan., had on his train a passenger who was said to be the only living person who knew the exact location of the sunken treasure. Curry purchased from the man charts of the treasure ship's location and formed a syndicate to find the gold on board which, it was said, had lain more than 60 years on the floor of the Pacific ocean.

A crew to man the Balboa was obtained here. It included Captain Clifford Casey, owner of the vessel; Robert Turner, a caretaker of a yacht club; Hans Pohlman, a sea skipper of the racing yacht Pointetria; an engineer, a second mate and two seamen.

The remains of the Golden Gate they found off Manzanillo without difficulty. Efforts to reach the treasure which lay in eight fathoms of rough water proved unsuccessful as a high surf and a heavy ground swell repeatedly upset their small skiff. Discouraged, the expedition put into Manzanillo, where they learned from the American

consul that other treasure-hunters had recovered the bullion years ago.

The expedition then headed for San Pedro. Their return voyage was one of hardships. They encountered a gale that continued for days. Their food and fuel supplies ran short. Seven hungry, weary and disappointed men stepped off the Balboa when it docked here.

BRITISHER DOUBTS GERMAN'S ABILITY TO PAY WAR DEBTS

BRUSSELS, June 22.—Germany can pay her reparations obligations only through a lowered standard of living, longer working hours and greater production per hour, Sir Josiah Stamp, British economist and co-author of the Dawes plan, told the international Chamber of Commerce at today's meeting here.

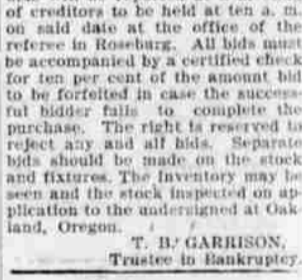
Sir Josiah expressed grave doubts of the continued successful working of the Dawes plan. He declared the time has come for serious study to be given the situation. The chief difficulties, he said, were the labor problem involved in the production of goods for reparations and the ruinous competition as a result of the import of goods into receiving countries without exports to offset them.

FRENCH OPERATION IN EVACUATION OF RUHR BEGINS SOON

(Associated Press Landed Wire.)

PARIS, June 22.—It was officially announced today that French operations for the evacuation of the Ruhr will begin within a short time. The announcement was made after the council of ministers approved the measures taken by the Painleve government for the execution of France's engagements concerning the Ruhr evacuation.

It was explained later that this meant the evacuation of Essen and the fulfillment by the Painleve government of the engagements of the preceding Herriot government to evacuate the Ruhr territory by August 15 to the line of Oberhausen, Mauthausen and Kettwig.

Apparently the political tension between Germany and France has been greatly relieved during the last few weeks. A French parliamentarian, explaining the situation said: "Germany is the only country in the world which is not asking France for something just now."

PRINCE CELEBRATES IN LIGHT OF CANDLES

NAVY WINS CLASSIC REGETTA ON HUDSON

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 22.—The eight-oared crew of the Naval Academy again ruled the intercollegiate race as the results of the annual regatta on the Hudson, but not by such an overwhelming margin that the Admirals have anything particularly to brag about.

Eight broad-backed, braveny rowing champions brought the variety rowing championship back yesterday evening by conquering Washington's two-time champions, in a thrilling, spectacular four mile duel, but at the finish they only won three quarters of a length ahead and losing distance with every stroke.

Washington's trans-continental quest for a third straight triumph—something that no crew has gained on the Hudson since Cornell did it in 1912—ended in failure but "Rusty" Callow's huskies lost no prestige. They had the power, the drive and strokes to match those of the navy, but they lost because they were out-manuevered, out-guessed at the critical stage of the race.

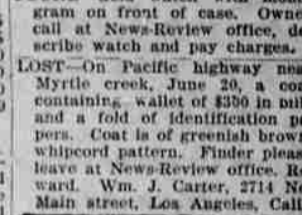
