SOUTHERN PACIFIC OPPOSES PROPOSED OREGON RAILROADS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, June 24.—Proposals of the Oregon Trunk Railway to make certain extensions to its line in central and southern Oregon were opposed before the Interstate Commerce Commission by the Southern Pacific Company,

which asserted that the Central Pacific, one of its own subsidiaries, had underway, or was projecting, a considerable mileage of new lines in the state.

The Oregon Trunk construction was declared by the S. P. Railway to be unnecessary duplication of facilities for the territory. The Southern Pacific also asserted the timber resources of the territory to be served, and that the traffic available in the area was not sufficient to support both new railroads.

Notice is hereby given that at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 15th day of June, 1925, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED that the Common Council of the City of Roseburg deems it necessary and hereby proposes to improve Parrott street from the north line of Maple street to the south line of Oak street, in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, in the following manner:

First: By grading said street to the proper sub-grade;

Second: By paving the roadway of said street twenty-six feet in width with reinforced concrete pavement;

Third: By constructing sub-drains, if necessary;

Fourth: By constructing street monuments;

Fifth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe, if necessary;

Sixth: By constructing catch-basins, if necessary;

Seventh: By constructing concrete curbs.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 15th day of June, 1925, which said grade, plans, specifications and estimates, are hereby approved and adopted.

The entire cost of said improvement, including engineering, interest and all other expenses which the City of Roseburg would not have incurred except for the making of said improvement, shall be assessed upon the property especially benefited thereby, as provided by the Charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and in accordance with the petition of the property owners to be benefited there by, and no part thereof shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.

The estimate of the City Engineer of the probable detailed cost of said improvement is the sum of \$2,728.66.

RESOLVED that the City Recorder of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, be and he is hereby directed to give notice of said improvement as provided by the Charter of said City.

PHILIPPINES HAVE 145 LABOR UNION WITH 89,402 MEMBERS

MANILA, June 24.—(A. P.)—There are registered in the Bureau of Labor 145 labor unions in the Philippine Islands with a membership of 89,402 including 57,402 men and 2,900 women. These figures do not include mutual benefit societies, of which there are 197 with a membership of 78,437.

Manila leads in the number of labor unions, a total of 76, or more than half of the total number in the entire archipelago, having their headquarters here, while the membership of the Manila unions number 61,775, or approximately two-thirds of the total membership in the islands.
