HEIR OF SEWING MACHINE MAGNATE PUNCHES SPOUSE

NEW YORK, June 25.—Domestic troubles of Arthur K. Bourne, Jr., grandson of Commodore Frederick R. Bourne, sewing machine magnate, who left a \$19,000,000 estate, have culminated in his arrest after a chase by his wife, who says he punched her nose.

FIRE SITUATION IN BEND WORSE

Hansen, 25, single, of Hammond, a fishing village near this city, became overheated at his work yesterday and stripping off his clothes dove into the Columbia river from a dock. The ebullient tide had inverted the water beneath the dock to a depth of a foot or so and Hansen's neck was broken, death occurring instantly.

Cook with gas. STAGE DRIVER IS DEAD FROM DRINK OF POISON MIXTURE

BEND, Ore., June 25.—George Standley, 44-year old stage driver, who drank empoisoned acid by mistake March 5, died late yesterday directly as a result of drinking the acid, which ate away the lining of his stomach, according to the physicians. He is said to have literally starved to death. Standley was driving a stage to Bend, when the accident happened more than an hour's ride from Bend. He stopped by the side of another machine and during the absence of the other driver, saw a bottle on the seat and without noticing the contents took a big swallow. When it was dis-

covered that he had drank the poison, he was rushed to Bend, but owing to bad roads arrival was delayed and it was some time before he received medical attention. Besides his widow, Stanley is survived by a three-year old daughter.

For full line camp equipment see Zigler-Fee Hdw. Co. CALIFORNIA CLUB USES U. S. MAILS EXTENSIVELY

LOS ANGELES, June 25.—Approximately 5,000,000 pieces will constitute the outgoing mail of the Automobile club of Southern California this year, it was indicated in statistics released recently by the headquarters of the organization. The figures were based on the amount of mail matter sent during 1924.

First-class letter postage of the motoring organization averages 3,500 letters a day. In addition 2,000 pieces of second-class mail matter and some 100 parcel post packages are sent, totaling for the daily outgoing mails an average of 5,500 pieces. The figure, allowing 300 working days in the year, revealed that the club sends out annually 1,650,000 pieces of mail.

However, this is but a fraction more than 50 per cent of the total outgoing mail for the organization sends out approximately 1,200,000 copies of its monthly magazine. In addition some 10,000 letters and packages are carried to 30 branch offices by the highway patrol fleet which the club maintains.

HEALTH BULLETIN TYPHOID VACCINATION

(State Board of Health) Typhoid fever can be prevented in a number of ways—most of them good. Since the disease is caused by swallowing the germs, anything that will kill them in what we eat or drink is effective. Since the summer season carries and drink by contamination with the wastes of people who excrete typhoid germs, anything that keeps these wastes from coming into contact with food and drink will prevent the disease.

These means are employed wherever sufficient supervision can be given, as in towns with active health departments. The water supply is carefully watched and is purified if necessary. Dairies are kept under control, and milk is usually pasteurized to make sure it is safe. Food-handlers are examined to see that they are not typhoid carriers, or people who, having had the disease, still excrete the germs, which are apt to infect the food which they handle.

All these methods are good, and in urban communities keep the typhoid fever cases down to a very low level. When we travel abroad, however, we are much more apt to come into contact with typhoid germs. The spring that we camp by may be polluted; the farmer who sells us our milk may be excreting typhoid germs, and include a few billions of them gratis per quart. Even at home we may run across a restaurant, where an unscrupulous carrier is more apt to serve us than he is to under these circumstances? There is another way besides avoiding the germs, by taking the fight to the enemy and strengthening our bodies against the germs, so that we may not develop the disease even if it gets in.

A person who gets typhoid fever develops resisting power to the germ. If he didn't, he'd never get well. This resisting power stays on for some years, and keeps him from getting typhoid fever again during that time, even though he should swallow the germs. It's the same sort of immunity that is produced by many other diseases. The body, however, does not distinguish between live and dead germs, when it starts fighting. In other words, it will fight dead germs, and thereby develop a resisting power, just as it would live ones. The dead ones, though, cannot multiply and produce typhoid fever. We take advantage of this fact of the body by injecting the dead typhoid bacilli under the skin. Thereby we fool our bodies into thinking that they have live ones to fight, and train them to be able to resist live ones, when they do meet them.

The fight of the body against the dead germs sometimes produces a little fever, but the great comfort of knowing we are protected against typhoid easily makes up for that. This typhoid vaccination is valuable at all times, but especially so when we contemplate a camping trip. If we take it every three years, we keep ourselves protected against all ordinary chances of getting the disease. Typhoid vaccination was mainly responsible for the great drop in the number of cases from the Spanish-American war to the late World War, with about two hundred cases per one thousand soldiers annually in the former and one-third cases per thousand per year in the latter.

COLD IN LONDON SENDS WOMEN IN SEARCH OF WRAPS

LONDON, June 25.—A sudden change in the weather sent the American and other women, who are to be presented at Buckingham Palace tonight scurrying in search of warmer wraps after all their plans had been made in accordance with the predictions of the weather prophets that the hot spell would continue.

It was so warm during the first court a few weeks ago several persons fainted and a number of innovations were brought into use to keep the presentees cool up to the last moment prior to their entering curty before the King and Queen.

Among these innovations were little ice boxes installed in the limousines, both to cool the interior of the vehicles and conserve the freshness of the bouquets during the wait of two or three hours in the mall, where the machines line up for their turn at the palace doorway.

Indications were this morning, however, that debutantes would have to use foot warmers in their cars tonight instead of ice boxes. Numerous dressmakers worked most of last night attending to customers desiring last minute changes, introducing furs and velvets in place of the embroidered shawls first provided.

KANSAS VETERANS NEGLECT TO COLLECT STATE BONUS

TOPEKA, Kan., June 25.—Scattered all over the globe are some 5,000 world war veterans entitled to share in the \$2,500,000 remaining in the Kansas soldier bonus fund, but ignorant of the fact that the money belongs to them.

"Sadder still," remarked Leslie E. Edmonds, state bonus director, "those veterans, who probably need the money, will not be able to get a cent of it after June 30. The state legislature has extended the time once, but will not do so again."

About 1,000 claims have been paid by the state since the legislature extended the time for considering applications. Most of these were paid to veterans in other states, or in foreign countries, who had just learned that Kansas was paying a bonus to men who were bona fide residents of the state at the time of enlistment or conscription.

INDIAN BUREAU TO DROP MANY WORKERS

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Two hundred and ninety-four employees in the field service of the Indian bureau including one or more in nearly every Indian agency and reservation in the country will lose their jobs July 1 under a sweeping reorganization plan announced here today.

The reduction of force will clip \$27,905 annually from the payroll. Clerks, stenographers, matrons, Indian police, judges and other officials are among those whose positions will be abolished. The number remaining on the bureau rolls July 1 will be 4,922.

FARM NEWS

Broccoli growers will transplant many hundreds of thousands of plants to the open field within the next 20 days. The growers who will come through the year with a full stand of plants will be those who have watched the details very closely. Experience has shown us that certain practices are good and very much worth while. Some of these practices are given with the hope that they will be considered by those who are growing the crop for the first time.

Twenty-five percent of the growers were successful this year in securing a good stand of thrifty plants, due in large part to the favorable growing weather during May and June. Seed beds that have been well cared for and now have a stand of thrifty plants should be hardened off before transplanting. The succulent plants cannot stand the first week of hot weather after transplanting to field. Plants that have suffered somewhat for moisture for a week or more in the seed bed are in much better shape to withstand the necessary shock of transplanting.

Removal of Plants From Seed Bed. After pulling plants out top to within one and a half inches of

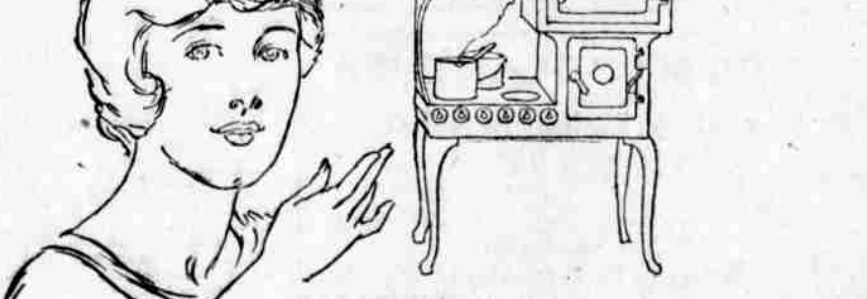
central bud. It is well to cut off top root more than one inch in length at time of top clipping. Immerse entire plant in a solution of blackleaf 40 plus a small amount of soap or Kayso. Make this solution as follows: Blackleaf, one tablespoon full to each gallon water used, add enough soap or other spreader to form a slight suds.

Remove plants and plunge the roots in a batter of thin mud. Plants are then ready for field planting. Planting will be done by hand planters or machine. Water Used in Planting. The amount of water used in planting will of course depend upon the moisture in the soil. The judgment of the operator will care for this point. Some growers have used certain commercial fertilizers in the water used for transplanting. This practice has but very little value and may be productive of some heavy losses of plants where incorrect amounts of fertilizer has been dissolved in the water.

Soil Preparation! The plan of preparing a field for broccoli will vary with the planter's ideas of good tillage. This vegetable demands a type of soil that has perfect drainage during every growing month from June to March.
