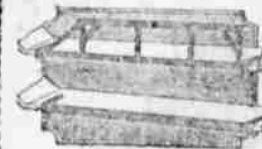

FIRE CONDITIONS IMPROVE RAPIDLY

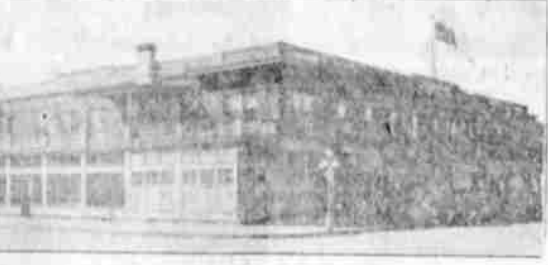
Nine forest fires have been reported so far as a result of the electric storm yesterday. Seven of these are inside the Deschutes National Forest and two are located in the Shewin-Hixon Company holdings adjoining the National forest.

The fire at Christman Lake, about 2 1/2 miles from the divide was not clearly visible this morning but it was thought to be about five acres in extent. No rain was reported from any part of the forest.
