## CELEBRATION AT OAKLAND TO BE BIG SUCCESS

Preparations Being Made to Handle Largest Crowd Ever Visiting City.

### PARADE TO BE HELD

Roseburg Band to Furnish Music Throughout Day — Judge Brown Will Deliver Address.

Unqualified success is predicted for Oakland's Fourth of July celebration to be held under the auspices of the Gobblers Friday and Saturday next week.

Preparations are being made for the largest crowd that ever visited this city and the program that has been prepared will leave nothing to be desired in the way of entertainment during the day. From the opening concert of the Douglas county band at 9 o'clock in the morning until midnight closes the Independence ball there will not be a dull moment.

Following the band concert on the street the first thing in the morning the parade will begin to move on its route through the city and to the celebration grounds promptly at 9:30. The parade will be led by the Douglas county band and a large number of decorated floats entered by lodges, business concerns and individuals will be in line. There will also be a beautiful Goddess float with Miss Naomi Pinkston as Goddess and a number of attendants. Miss Dessie Dardoff will appear as Miss Oregon in another float and will be attended by children representing the states of the union. Miss Doris Crandell will be Miss Columbia. Prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 are offered for the best floats.

Appropriate band selections will begin the program at the celebration grounds. These will be followed by a vocal solo by Mrs. Fred Strang of Roseburg, with band accompaniment, and an address of welcome by Mayor R. D. Bridges. Judge George M. Brown of the state supreme court, will deliver the Independence Day oration which will be one of the leading features of the celebration program. Judge Brown has many friends and acquaintances in this section who are looking forward with pleasure to hearing him on this occasion.

At 11:30 a short time will be allowed for dinner. There will be stands on the grounds to provide refreshments and there will also be opportunity for those who bring basket lunches to spread them in picnic style.

The afternoon program will start with a band concert at the grandstand at 12:15. Then will come the ball game and the race events. Teams from Roseburg and Yoncalla have been matched for the ball game which will be called at 12:30. It is expected that this will finish in plenty of time to start the races at 2:30.

A splendid race card has been arranged by the committee in charge and the various events and purses are shown in detail in another column. The premier event will be the one mile Gobblers handicap for a purse of \$250. Several entries are assured for this race including Joey G., owned by Hobson & McCaslin of Myrtle Point, who won a similar event of July 5 last year. There will be two other events open to all entries, a half-mile and five-eighths, with purses of \$150 and \$100. There will also be a half-mile Douglas county pony race and a half-mile saddle horse race also limited to Douglas county entries. The other events are a quarter-mile Shetland pony race, and a half-mile consolation race. The latter will be open to all horses that have run during the meet but have not been in on the morning. The purse for this event will be \$100, which like the others, will be divided 70 per cent to the winner, 20 per cent to second place and 10 per cent to third place. Entrance fees will be 5 per cent of the purse of each race.

A number of foot races and other similar events are being arranged and these will take place on the track in front of the grandstand between the horse races. In the grove there will be an astro-ride swing in operation during the day for the entertainment of the children.

The executive committee has decided to adopt the same method of selling tickets as was followed last year. Tickets will be sold at the entrance to the grounds that will include not only admission to the grounds but to the program, ball game and races. The price of the tickets will also be the same, 50c for adults and 25c for children of grammar school age. Grandstand seats will be 25c but there will be no charge for cars or for parking space. Tickets will be on sale in a number of places down town before the parade and a good deal of delay can be avoided if local people will secure theirs before going to the grounds.

There will be varied forms of entertainment during the evening, athletic contests, movies and dance. A wrestling match between Paul Amort of Roseburg and "Sailor Jack" Woods of Texas is scheduled to take place at the grandstand early in the evening. On ac-

 The wrestling match will be preceded by a 6-round boxing preliminary between two well known fighters of this section. The match will be held on a raised platform in front of the grandstand beginning at 7:45. Tickets for this event will be \$1.65 for ringside

seats and \$1.10 for general admission.  
 Although there will be no dance floor on the grounds this year, dancing at the Gobblers hall will begin at 8 p. m. The street in front of the hall will be roped off and used for the overflow crowd. A large orchestra is being arranged for and the best of music is assured.  
 Manager W. G. Thiel of the Bungalow theater, has also made preparations to accommodate those of the celebration crowd who wish to take in a movie show. As a special attraction he has secured "The Navigator," a bubbling comedy with Buster Keaton in the leading role. He will put on two shows beginning at 7:15 and 9.

In addition to the program planned for the Fourth, a fine race card has been arranged for the afternoon of July 5 in which a number of outside horses will take part besides the local entries. The Gobblers Special, a mile race with a purse of \$200, will be the leading event but there will also be half-mile and five-eighths mile heats. A novelty race, Shetland pony race and a mile race are also scheduled. In all there will be seven events on that day. The admission charge of 50c on the third will include grandstand seats for those who desire them.

Provision has been made for the decoration of streets with strings of flags for the celebration and it is requested by the committee that every business house be properly decorated with flags and bunting.
