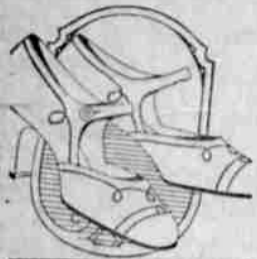

JEW INVEST HEAVILY IN PALESTINE LANDS

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

JERUSALEM, June 26.—(A. P.)—The Jewish National Fund has invested almost \$5,000,000 in the purchase and improvement of land in Palestine from October, 1920, to April, 1925, approximately the period of Sir Herbert Samuel's administration as high commissioner, according to a report issued by the world headquarters of the fund here.

Of this money \$5,194,140 was spent in the purchase of agricultural and urban land and \$774,150 in land improvements, including the drying up of swamps, road building, water supply installation and building boats to new settlers. Twenty-nine of the 43 colonies established by the Palestine Foundation Fund (Keren Hayesod) during this period, were built on land purchased by the Jewish National Fund. This includes the dozen colonies thus far established by the Palestine Foundation Fund as part of its colonization scheme in building up the Valley of the Jezreel.

Both the Jewish National Fund and the Palestine Foundation Fund are financial agencies of the World Zionist Organization, the former being a land-purchasing agency, and the latter engaged in the principal constructive enterprise such as agriculture, education, public health and promotion of trade and industry, aimed at the rebuilding of the Jewish Homeland.
