**FOREIGN ACTORS WARMLY WELCOMED IN BRAZIL**

(Associated Press—Special Wire.)  
RIO DE JANEIRO, June 29.—The best drama now offered Brazilian theatre-goers is presented at Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo by visiting companies from Paris, Madrid, Lisbon, Italy and Mexico. These companies play in their native languages and draw big crowds, as their productions are first-class, as the cosmopolitan Brazilian is an excellent linguist. One of the biggest hits made in Brazil during recent years was accorded in 1924 to an Italian company which staged a series of plays including King Lear, Othello, and one of Ibsen's plays.

American drama recently was introduced to the people of Brazil, the play being "Baby Mine," the farce by Margaret Mayo, which was given by two companies during the same week, a Brazilian stock company and a London company stopping in Rio de Janeiro on its way to Buenos Aires.

Native drama has not developed to a very stimulating level. There is one stock company giving comedies of modern Brazilian life. The Brazilian is an enthusiastic American moving picture fan.

**ANTHOPE HERD THRIVES IN CANADIAN NATIONAL PARK**

CALGARY, Alta., June 29.—Anthople which were threatened with extinction in Canada have been successfully preserved in Nevisian National Park. When the preserve was established in 1915 there were only 45 in the herd, the last survivors of the thousands that once had roamed the prairies. There are now 225 animals in the herd, a gain of 190. How well they breed in captivity is shown by the fact that there was an increase of 55 in 1924 alone.

Anthople once were prized trophies and suffered such ravages in numbers that extinction of the species was in sight. A herd finally was discovered in Southern Alberta and the rest of the story is told when the animals were feeding was surrounded by a fence of woven wire and all the work was done without disturbing the animals.
