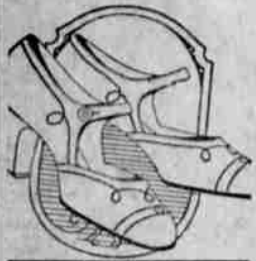

EVOLUTION ROW IS ON IN OREGON

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALISBURY, Ore., June 29.—A resolution bill which has stirred the country through the Scopes case will be initiated in Oregon, Washington and California to be passed by the electorate of those three states, according to Dr. E. A. Cantrell, who has charge of debating Dr. W. B. Riley in California, Oregon and Washington, on the question of teaching evolution in the schools.

Dr. Cantrell declares that the first big gun in the battle to put over the Anti-evolution bill in three coast states, will be fired in September, when the Rev. William Sunday, Evangelist, opens with a series of meetings in Portland and asserts that Sunday's opening guns will be followed by a barrage throughout the three states by such speakers as William Jennings Bryan, Dr. W. B. Riley, and others.

While the Tennessee bill was passed by the legislature of that state, Dr. Cantrell says that in the three coast states the effort will be made to put over the bill before any legislature will have a chance to convene and take the fight directly to the people.

Dr. Cantrell last night telegraphed Dr. Riley at Seattle, asking that a date be set definitely for the debates in Salem and Eugene and states the debate here probably will be on July 24 and at Eugene July 9.

Feeley, the American commercial attaché here, to resume negotiations already started towards establishing a number of technical scholarships for Argentine students in some of the great industrial establishments in the United States.

CARE OF FEET VERY IMPORTANT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

General care of the human body with special emphasis on the feet came in for a large share of the discussions at today's sessions of the conference of the Northwest Medical Association.

Dr. Arthur A. Gray, of Seattle, in discussing the proper clothing for children said that many mothers start their children off wrong in life by trying to dress them in style rather than as a means of protecting them from the elements.

Dr. Gray denounced short socks for growing children in winter and spring months. He also paid his respects, inversely speaking, to shoe clerks who sell women shoes for their children that are "the latest thing" rather than "the best thing".

The physician said that shoes had more to do with the general health of both children and adults than most people realized.

He said button shoes and patent leather shoes should be avoided as a regular thing.

Other physicians, among them, Professor Lewellyn F. Barker of Johns Hopkins University, said that no reputable physician now days attempts to handle a case without first taking into consideration the patient's mental condition.

Some time was given to the discussion of "sick complexes" which were described as cases of persons who merely imagine themselves sick. These, it was asserted, were numerous.

FORD NOT BIDDING FOR WOODEN VESSELS

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Bids from twenty individuals and companies were opened by the fleet corporation today for sale of 200 shipping board vessels for scrap.

No explanation was available as to why Mr. Ford who had indicated an intention of bidding did not submit a tender and Chairman O'Connor of the shipping board said he had received no communication from the manufacturer on the subject.

The bids were for varying numbers of the vessels under varying conditions and differed widely.

Only one bid for the entire 200 was received, it being from the Boston and Iron Metal Company of Baltimore for a blanket sale at \$1,370,000. The General Metal Supply company of Oakland, Cal., made an offer for 193 vessels under varying conditions which ran from \$200 to \$4,000 each.
