TELEPHONE FACILITIES ON WEST SIDE OF CITY ARE BEING EXTENDED.

In order to supply the increasing demand for telephone service in West Roseburg and the Laurelswood Addition, the Telephone Company has a crew of men replacing sections of the present lines with cable.

This work is well under way but will not be completed for some two or three weeks as it is necessary to extend this cable from this side of the river and make the river crossing at a new location.

There are numerous details to be worked out and at the present time expert cable splicers are on the job taking care of the difficult task of connecting all of the small wires going to make up the cable. As soon as this is done, the work will proceed rapidly and those now waiting for service will be taken care of.

WIFE CALLS HUSBY "A DIRTY LIAR"

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) TACOMA, Wash., July 2.—While George S. Conger was on the witness stand today in his trial for the murder of Robert S. Heale last May 3, his wife, Mrs. Mollie Conger, sobbed hysterically, arose to her feet, and shouted:

"George, you're a dirty liar." Conger had just given a dramatic story of the shooting. He told how Heale had broken up his home and how he had been pleading with Heale to leave his wife alone, and with his wife to return to Bellingham with him.

"I broke, lost myself and killed him," Conger said as his wife made her accusation. Conger shot Heale to death in the Conger home here where Heale had been living with Mrs. Conger while her husband was at work in Bellingham. Heale was a prominent contractor.
