BATTLESHIP PRESENTED

(Associated Press Local Wire.) PORTLAND, July 3.—The historic old battleship Oregon which lies dismantled in the Willamette river here was today presented to the state of Oregon by the United States government to be used as a relic. The presentation was made by Rear-Admiral J. V. Chase, commandant of the thirteenth naval district at Bremerton, Wash., who represented Secretary of the Navy Curtis D. Wilbur. The ship was accepted on behalf of the state by United States Senator Robert Nelson Stanfield. The reason the presentation was made today instead of tomorrow, July 4, was because today is the 27th anniversary of the battle of Santiago in which the Oregon played such a conspicuous part. The Oregon was specifically exempted from restriction at the Washington arms conference on condition that it be used for exhibition purposes only.
