eastern standard time that the two main opponents would be in the ring in ten minutes.

Walker came into the ring at 8:25 eastern standard time, wearing the well known purple sweater and trunks.

Grab followed a minute later. Both boys looked ill for their little match.

Grab enjoyed a seven round advantage over his welterweight challenger, the middleweight title holder weighing 155 with Walker scaling 152. Virtually every corner of the Polo Grounds was filled as the main go got under way.

The fight by rounds:

**Round One**  
Walker took the lead at the bell, landing a jab to Grab's right cheek and a left to the head. They fought furiously in the center of the ring trading rights and lefts recklessly. A stiff right uppercut rocked Walker's head. Walker countered with two rights to the jaw and Grab went back to the ropes. Grab measured Walker with a right to the jaw. They both were fighting willingly, trading punches at will. The park was in an uproar. They sparred for an opening at the bell.

**Round Two**  
They traded punches to the body at close quarters. Grab rushed Walker to the ropes where he poured a furious head and body attack on his challenger. Walker's head rocked from a furious right.

Another right drove him to the corner. Walker landed a beautiful left to Grab's midsection and followed it with a right to the same place. The milling was furiously fast. Grab rocked Walker with a right and left to the head and the welterweight king came up to his knees, but he was up immediately. The men were slugging mercilessly. The bell ended the furious fighting.

**Round Three**  
They continued the maddening face, both fighting openly. A terrific left to the ribs shook Walker. They clinched. Walker secured heavily to Grab's body. At close quarters Grab landed five times to Mickey's face and body. A stinging downward right to Walker's face slowed the welterweight king. They were engaged in an exchange of blows at the bell.

**Round Four**  
Walker landed a left to the body. Grab countered with a stinging right to the face which staggered Walker. Another beautiful right to the face sent Walker back on his heels. A third one weakened Walker. They traded punches to the head. They wrestled in a neutral corner. Grab was in and out to the body before Walker could counter. The maddening pace was stacking and the boys were dancing around at the bell.

**Round Five**  
Grab landed his right to Walker's uncovered jaw, but Walker countered with a lightning blow to Grab's jaw. The blood began to show from Walker's mouth. They traded body blows at close quarters. Walker landed his left to Grab's body but took a stiff right to the body and head in return. They were sparring for an opening at the bell.

**Round Six**  
Grab continued his windmill tactics and drove both gloves to Walker's jaw with lightning rapidity. Walker doubted Grab with a left to the body. Walker landed another beautiful body blow. They traded blows in a neutral corner. Grab having the advantage. Grab landed four uppercuts and crossed with his right to the jaw. A left to the jaw backed Grab. They were locked tight at the bell.

**Round Seven**  
Walker staggered Grab with a terrific right to the jaw. Grab countered by staggering Walker with a like blow. They looked in a tight clinch frequently. The infighting was furious. A hard short to the face caused Grab to reel. A right uppercut hurt Walker. A straight right backed him to the ropes. Grab missed a windmill left. In endeavoring to break the men from a clinch, referee Purdy fell to the floor and the fighters fell over him. The bell found the fighters sprawling on the floor.

**Round Eight**  
A triphammer right bored its way to Walker's head. Six seconds later Grab landed a right to Walker's head and landed precisely to the body, but took four on the head in exchange. Walker missed an uppercut, but took one in exchange. Grab rushed Walker to a neutral corner, battering him with blows from every direction. They stood toe to toe and struggled. They traded blows in close quarters. Walker's head rocked from the force of Grab's right but as the bell sounded.

**Round Nine**  
They met in the center of the ring. Both stroking rapidly and each landing effective blows. A straight right to Walker's face sent him to the ropes. Walker took another on the chin, but fought manly against Grab's fierce attack. Walker rushed Grab

to the ropes. They clinched. Grab measured Walker but Walker beat him to the punch to the head. They were mixing it up in the center of the ring at the bell.

**Round Ten**  
Grab landed a left to the jaw. Grab was covering nicely. He staggered Walker with a vicious body blow. Walker sunk back on his heels when the one-two punch landed to his jaw, but he came back strongly. A stinging right to the jaw turned Grab half around. It was a beautiful shot. Walker landed again to the head, tying in the resulting clinch. Both were serving straight to the head and landing telling blows. Four times Grab's right found Walker's chin just as the bell rang.

**Round Eleven**  
They wrestled around the ring, neither landing effectively. A clean right staggered Grab, when it landed on his uncovered jaw. Grab missed his right and Walker scored twice to Grab's jaw. The fighting was tremendously fast. Walker landed to the head landing both his right and left and drove Grab to cover, as the judges' pack yelled its applause. Another clinch upset the referee again. They stood in a neutral corner and punched furiously at will while the referee was struggling to his feet. The bell ended the milling.

**Round Twelve**  
They smashed at each other jaw, both landing cleanly. In a maddening exchange of blows, they punched each other at will. Walker staggered Grab with a vicious right to the head. Walker landed effectively to the body and head and Grab clinched. Grab landed with terrific force to Walker's jaw, but the welterweight stumbled away from Grab. The crowd gasped as the battlers stood up under the fierce punishment. They were locked in a clinch at the bell.

**Round Thirteen**  
They stood toe to toe in Walker's corner and atched Grab's right. Walker's left eye started to swell as Grab continued to pepper at Walker's face. Grab missed a downward right. The one-two punch backed Walker to the ropes. They continued to batter each other openly at long range. Grab rushed Walker to the corner and the bell interrupted an interesting skirmish.

**Round Fourteen**  
Grab continued his aggressiveness but Walker was willing and they smothered away openly. Both landing telling blows. Grab started to dance and Walker came in to a one two punch which forced him to clinch. A stinging right to the jaw rocked Walker to his own corner and he reeled about the ring helpless against Grab's furious attack. He was almost out, but pulled himself together and staggered Grab with a short left to the face. Gannely-Walker fought on, badly battered but taking everything Grab could throw and standing up right under the tremendous punishment. The bell saved Walker from further punishment.

**Round Fifteen**  
They shook hands. A right to the head rocked Walker around. He countered manly with a left, maling beautifully. Mickey got all in a furious charge at Grab, sending him back to cover. Blood streamed down his face from a cut on his left eye, but Walker bore it in, holding his own in a fight to the exchange of blows that threatened to sweep both to the floor of the ring. Walker staggered Grab with a wicked left to the head. Walker charged Grab, driving him to his own corner as he relentlessly pounded his driving gloves at the middleweight king.

The bell found them battling away at full speed.
