## CHURCH UNION ADVOCATED FOR GOOD RELIGION

Interdenomination Cooperation Urged by Speaker at C. E. Convention.

### WANT WORLD PEACE

Daily Prayer for World Friendship Part of Program at International Meeting.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—Close cooperation by and between various denominations was urged by the Rev. Dr. William Hiram Foulkes, pastor of the Old Stone Presbyterian church of Cleveland, in his address at the thirtieth international Christian Endeavor convention in session here. He urged churches to remove their "denominational blinders."

"What possible excuse can the churches of America and Europe have for perpetuating all of their historic and traditional divisions?" asked Dr. Foulkes. "How absurd to attempt to carry American civil war distinctions and others of even less consequence into the heart of China! One wholesome reflection arising out of the foreign missionary work of the Protestant church is the conclusion that the church on the mission field will increasingly demand denominational cooperation and even union. Already great strides have been taken towards such a consummation.

"The evils of denominationalism are so apparent that it is quite easy to become confused and embittered and to indulge in invective. All of this, however, is as futile as the evil it seeks to correct. The great issue is to know how to find the way out. That way will point the church forward to something better.

"Interdenominational cooperation of the proper sort does not require us to surrender our identity but to field them by their tradition, tradition, vintage point after vintage point for the common good. It involves that we should make a common survey of our task. We ought to remove the denominational blinders from our eyes and to look out upon the whole field as though it were one field for one united church.

"In addition to a cooperative survey of our task, we also much have cooperative planning. It would avail little to have a common task if we were to begin to plan its accomplishment by diverse methods. We need also to have an increasing measure of fellowship in our task and, best and most constant of all, actually to work together. We have in our hands the largest opportunity that has yet confronted the Protestant church."

World Peace Is Prayer.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—World-wide daily prayer on the part of Christian Endeavorers for a revival of religion and for world peace and friendship, were items recommended in the two-year program of activities reported today to the thirtieth international Christian Endeavor convention by Edward P. Gates, general secretary.

Other features in the program included definite service of Christian Endeavorers in soul-winning and missionary campaigns in their own local churches and communities.

"Modernists and Fundamentalists always have and no doubt will continue in battle on any given Christian Endeavor program of service for Christ and the Church in their own communities," said Mr. Gates. "The Christian Endeavor standards are sufficiently general to apply to societies everywhere. Church and denominational loyalty in addition to cooperative community and world service are emphasized.

"In order to accomplish the purpose of our mission in the world while we are in it, we must not only recognize our allegiance to Jesus Christ, our Saviour and Lord, but we must strive to make our community a better place in which to live by insisting that His teachings should be applied to social, industrial and community life.

"The program of cooperative service activities outlined for the next two years are correlated with the topics to be discussed at the weekly meetings of the 50,000 individual societies with their 4,000,000 members throughout the world, said Mr. Gates. Approximately 50 denominations are represented by these societies, his report stated.

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## SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION TO HOLD MEETING

The fifth annual meeting of the Lane and Douglas county members of the American Sunday School Union will be held at the McKeon Fish hatchery Sunday, July 12, according to announcement made yesterday. About 100 are expected to be in charge of the affair.

E. E. Martin, superintendent of the Northwest territory of the union, will attend the meeting and will address the gathering Sunday morning at Sunday school work, addressing a gathering at Roseburg the following Sunday.

Secretary R. E. Kelly, district vice-president of the organization, will also be present and will speak in the afternoon on Sunday at the superintendent work. Mr. Kelly has

had 22 years experience as superintendent of Sunday schools and is well fitted to speak on the subject.

Nine gatherings of union Sunday schools will be held this year in Lane and Douglas counties under the auspices of the Sunday school union. It is announced.

Every effort has been made to keep the cost as low as possible, and the committee has placed the fee at \$5 for the first week and \$4 for each successive week. If the expenses are not as heavy as the amount received from the fees paid, a refund will be made on a pro-rata basis.

## PORTLAND'S POPULATION

Portland's population is estimated by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company at 350,000, based on the same ratio of telephones in use as obtains in other cities on the Pacific coast. By the same calculation the population of Los Angeles is placed at 1,100,000, placing a sixth among the country's large cities. It ranked tenth in the federal census of 1923. According to an estimate by the Chamber of Commerce Portland has 250,000 inhabitants, including the suburbs, which commercially are part of the city.

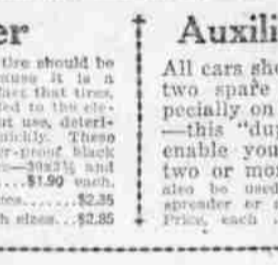

WORK IS STARTED ON BENTON MINE

SCIENTISTS IN HOUSE CAR TO STUDY MIGRATORY BIRDS

McPHEESON, Kans., July 6. (A. P.)—A study of bird life from South Dakota to Mexico City, and back along the western coast of Mexico and the United States to Canada, will be made this summer by Prof. H. H. Nininger, head of the biology department of McPherson College here.

Prof. Nininger will make the trip under the auspices of the National Ornithology Society, and it is expected to result in the most important discoveries in the interests of ornithology.

The party will start from western South Dakota and travel in a housecar built especially for the purpose. Cars will be taken to keep well ahead of cold weather, so that the birds can be studied in advance of the migratory period for the American species. Crossing the Rio Grande, the party will continue south, gathering data on the species both rare and common to Mexico. While there, the migratory birds of the northland, which will

SECRETARY LOCAL CHAMBER COMMERCE SPEAKS AT EUGENE

EUGENE, Ore., July 6.—With Oregon cities represented, the fifth annual short course for commercial secretaries, started at the University of Oregon this morning. Secretaries representing at least 30 organizations are

expected to register today and tomorrow, according to E. C. Robinson, dean of the school of business administration.

The group devoted the morning to discussions on "protecting the public," and on the automobile tourist situation. L. Antles, of Roseburg, led the first discussion, declaring that saving the money of accountancy from deceptions, of fake stock sellers and others who cause financial losses was as important a part of a Chamber of Commerce, as the promotion of its own welfare.

F. D. Hargis, of Walla Walla, described the working of the better business bureau of his city in regard to the curbing sales of stocks. He also told of a plan worked out with the schools and colleges in that community whereby the annual student publications are put out without the usual advertising from merchants. The saving in the printing bill and the economies in other ways made it easy for the annuals to be published without the advertising support, he pointed out.

LATE RAINS IN CALIFORNIA UPSET OUTDOOR MOVIE PLAN

LOS ANGELES, July 6.—Unusually late rains in southern California this spring not only damaged fruit and grain to some extent but also retarded film crops. Movie producers of Hollywood report a loss of more than \$500,000 due to the unseasonal rainfall.

After the middle of April film producers, expecting clear days, prepared for outside scenes. The late rains upset all calculations, forced important "takes" to be suspended and in some cases, compelled the use of expensive indoor sets for pictures which could have been made more economically out of doors.
