SLAYS WIFE AND CHILD AND THEN COMMITS SUICIDE

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 7.—Attacking members of his family with a large knife while they were sleeping, Ernest Franzen killed his wife and one of his children today and sent four other children into the street in their night clothes, injured and screaming for help. He then killed himself.

Franzen, evidently suddenly crazed, first attacked his wife, Ellen, 39.

She was found dead in the kitchen. In a bedroom on the second floor was found the body of Morris, 9, their youngest child. When police arrived Franzen lay dying in another bedroom with his throat cut.

Four other children, ranging in age from 11 to 16 years, sought hiding places in terror when the father ran amok. But all were slain, one seriously, before they were able to evade him and flee from the house. Ethel, 11, was reported in a serious condition with a wound in the neck.

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EIGHT DROWNED AT SUNDAY SCHOOL PICNIC

ST THOMAS, Ont., July 7.—The death toll in last night's Sunday school picnic tragedy at Pinafore Lake, where two flat-bottom boats, tied together, carrying 27 children and a teacher, capsized, was put today at eight persons. The teacher, Mrs. Watts, and seven of her charges, were drowned. Early today all but two bodies had been recovered. The dead are Mrs. Watts; Edith Robertson, 8 years old, Murray Barnes, 5; Frances Vidler, 9; Rowland Smith, 8; Jean Robertson, 12; Alfred Sutherland, 5; Jean Murray, 7. All are from St. Thomas.

Darwin Didn't Originate Evolution

Scientists DON'T Believe Man is Descended From Apes

Only uninformed persons have the idea that "evolution" is some theory hatched by Charles Darwin, and that evolution is founded on the belief that man is descended from monkeys.

Darwinism is not a term synonymous with evolution. No scientist worthy of the name today believes that monkeys are an ancestor of man.

Evolution goes much farther back than Charles Darwin. That all living organisms have been derived by gradual evolution from simpler forms was an idea proposed by the ancient Greeks.

In the thousands of years that have followed many have conjectured about the mechanism that might have produced this evolution. But not until the later years of the eighteenth century and the beginning of the nineteenth century did any thinkers base their explanations of evolution on actual observations. Among these early thinkers there stand out the names of Buffon, Erasmus Darwin, grandfather of Charles, Lamarck and Goethe, who was a great biologist as well as a great poet.

Charles Darwin's name is associated with evolution more strongly than any other because he popularized it, and because he was the center of an evolution controversy similar in some respects to the Scopes case, that was stirred up in England half a century ago.

Since Darwin's time his ideas have been modified and much has been added to them. His greatness as a scientist remains unqualified. As a scientist says: "Science always is changing as new researches are made. It is no more to be expected that Darwin should have been entirely right than that the ancient Greeks should have been entirely right; nor is it to be expected that modern science is entirely right."

From Main Stem, Branches. Evolution does not teach and the scientist is not taught, that man was descended from a monkey. What it does teach is that man belongs to the order of the primates or higher forms of life which emerged about the dawn of a remote of the Eocene era; and that man, the various types of monkeys, apes and other of the higher animal forms are something like remote cousins.

In other words, all came from a common ancestor. Man no more descended from the monkey or the ape than the latter descended from man, says evolution.

Recently evidence was dug up which tends to indicate that man preceded monkeys on the earth.

From the main stem of the primates there were various branches. First, the South American monkey, then the Old World Monkeys, then apes later, from the main stem, "the branch now represented by the small anthropoid apes, the baboon and the siamang. Distinctly later there diverged the branch of the larger anthropoid

apes—the gorilla, the chimpanzee and the orang."

That, it is explained, left "a generalized humanoid stock separated off from the monkeys and apes, and including the immediate precursors of man." Here, at least, say the scientists, we are getting somewhere, safely away from the detested, degrading monkey, whom nobody wants, and need have, for an ancestor. And the time of this definite separation is estimated at anything like 500,000 to 2,000,000 years ago. No danger of identifying ancestors there, by any lengthening out of anybody's family tree, comfort the exponents of evolution. This separation, it is definitely believed, took place in Asia, and man began his own long ages of development.

Evidence for Scatters. To those who question the proof or evidence of evolution with respect to man, scientists give many answers. Professor Conklin of Princeton university declares that "everything which speaks of the evolution of plants and animals speaks plainly of the evolution of man. In the structure of the human body there is scarcely a bone, muscle, nerve or other organ that does not have its counterpart in the higher primates, and especially the anthropoid apes."

And if we reject the natural explanation of hereditary descent from a common ancestor, we can only suppose that the Deity, in creating man, took the most scrupulous pains to make him in the image of the beast.

A common demand of the doubters is that evidence be furnished, "while they wait," as to how evolution works. There are thoughtful persons, says Joseph McCabe, who ask why we cannot turn a man-like ape into a man. "They never ask," he says, "whether we could turn a negro or a red Indian into a white European. Yet the white, black and red men had a common ancestor, probably less than 20,000 years ago, whereas it is certainly more than 1,000,000 years, probably 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 years, since the common ancestor of the ape and man lived."
