## BIGGEST STILL ON COAST FOUND ON SMALL ISLAND

Governor's Agents Seize Huge Distillery and Equipment Yesterday.

## MUCH LIQUOR FOUND

Plant Includes 2 Stills, 35 Vats, Steam Boilers and 200 Gallons of Mash—Fire on Suspects.

SALEM, Ore., July 8.—Capture by agents working directly out of the governor's office of a still late yesterday afternoon on a brush island in the Willamette river about a mile and a quarter from St. Paul, this county, revealed the largest illicit liquor plant yet seized on the coast, according to officials. The plant includes two stills, each one as large as the still seized at Mount Angel a few months ago. In addition capture was made of 25 vats, each containing from 150 to 200 gallons of corn mash, two four horse power steam boilers, and the complete equipment of an up-to-date distillery. The still was located in a canvas structure, about 40 feet square concealed in the brush on the island. The agents, R. W. and A. C. Smith and A. Christenson, work directly from the governor's office and not under the state prohibition director. Since July 3 they had been working on a tip that a small still was operating somewhere in the St. Paul district.

While ramming through the brush last night, looking for the still near the river somewhere, they sighted two men on the island who they were certain were connected with distilling or bootlegging operations. They were just pushing off from the island in a small boat. The agents shouted at them to stop, but the men ran furiously away. The agents let loose a fusillade of bullets, they stated, but the men made their getaway. The agents stated they made no effort to hit them.

## WOMAN HIKES TO ROSEBURG SEEKING MISSING HUSBAND

Mrs. G. C. Shreve, of Portland, arrived in this city today, penniless, and in search of her husband, who has been missing for the past two weeks. Mrs. Shreve states that her husband left Portland a month ago, searching for work. He hiked to Roseburg she says, and wrote back to her two weeks ago that he was too fatigued to continue, and that he was searching for work here. She received no further reports, and so started in search of him, arriving today, after a trip from Portland in which she was given lifts by accommodating motorists most of the way. She was broke upon her arrival and appealed to the Chamber of Commerce for help in locating her husband.

## THIRD BROTHER OF GENNA GANG SHOT IN CHICAGO

Unknown Assailant Kills Tony Genna—Five Bullets in Body.

## ARRAIGNED TUESDAY

Was Fined for Connection With Shooting of Police Five Weeks Ago—Swears Vengeance.

CHICAGO, July 8.—Tony Genna died in the county hospital at 3:55 p. m. CHICAGO, July 8.—Gangsters again blazed in Chicago streets today, seriously wounding Tony Genna, third of the Genna brothers to fall in six weeks in the feuds and rivalries of beer runners. At the county hospital where Genna was immediately placed on the operating table, five bullets were found in his body. One had pierced a lung and another injured his spinal cord. His head was bruised from his fall to the pavement. Genna was shot twice by unknown assailants as he walked along the street. One bullet lodged in Genna's head, and another pierced his abdomen. He is in a critical condition. The scene of the attack was not far from where the body of Joseph Lomerelli, victim of a kidnaping blackhand ring, was found Monday.

## HEAT WAVE IN EAST TAKES 9 LIVES AS TOLL

## Dozens Victims of Prostrations Throughout East and Midwest.

## LIGHTNING KILLS ONE

Lights at Summer White House Put Out of Commission by Flash—Dark Half Hour.

NEW YORK, July 8.—The second day of the heat wave which swept down upon the east from the middle-west, has caused at least nine deaths and dozens of prostrations. Violent thunderstorms in most sections yesterday brought early temporary relief. Scores of buildings were struck by lightning. The electric lights at the White House were put out of commission and President and Mrs. Coolidge sat in darkness half an hour. In New York City a temperature of 90 with high humidity killed one man and prostrated nine other persons. Three boys were drowned, a white youth giving his life in a futile attempt to save two negro boys in the Harlem river. One died in Hoboken, N. J., and two were overcome. Lightning killed a motorcyclist who sought shelter from the rain under a tree in Medford, Mass. Three women and a man under the same tree were stunned. A farmer near Wheatshole, Pa., died of heart failure while firemen battled a fire in his barn, struck by lightning. There were two deaths in Washington, the mercury being up to 105 on Pennsylvania Avenue.

## GOLF IS CAUSE OF MATRIMONIAL BREAK

DES MOINES, July 8.—Happiness reigned in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sanford E. Hinshaw of this city until they took up golf. Mrs. Hinshaw in a suit for divorce today said that her husband imposed "barbaric restrictions" upon her on the golf course. He would kick her ball off the course every time she made a good approach, she said, and especially would he do this when she reached the green in less strokes than he did. The judge granted the divorce and \$50 a month alimony.

## THOUSANDS RIFF TROOPS REPORTED ADVANCING SOUTH

FEZ, July 8.—Today's French official communique says 10,000 of Abd-El-Krim's Rifian tribesmen hostile to the French are pressing forward along the Ouergha river and seem determined to strike south for Fez.

## MADRID, July 8.—France and Spain today signed an agreement for co-operation in Morocco against Abd-El-Krim's Rifian tribesmen who refuse to accept their authority.

FEZ, French Morocco, July 8.—The French have destroyed and abandoned some of their outposts north of Quezzan. Presumably this is part of the consolidation of lines accompanying the French counter-offensive intended to offset Abd-El-Krim's attempts to capture Taza.

## FRED MERRILL IS SENT TO PRISON AFTER LONG FIGHT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—Fred Merrill, former Portland councilman and former resort owner, was ordered to jail today by Federal Judge Wolvorton after a fight in the courts that has lasted nearly two years. Merrill must go to jail for six months and pay a fine of \$250 following his conviction in January, 1924, of conducting a nuisance and selling liquor at a road house. The United States district court has received a mandate from the United States court of appeals, denying Merrill's petition for a new trial.

## PORTLAND COMPANY SUES FOR PAYMENT

MEDFORD, Ore., July 8.—M. Sells & Company today filed a civil suit in the circuit court against Mary Chase and J. C. Olinger, for the collection of \$509 and \$250 damages. The \$509 is alleged to be due on merchandise and \$250 for failure to return the goods. The complaint sets forth that on April 25 last, equipment for use at the Jackson Hot Springs resort near here, was purchased at Portland by Mary Chase, \$310 down and the balance at \$200 per month until paid for. No payments, it is asserted have been made.

## ROBBERY ATTEMPT HALTED BY MOTOR

SALEM, Ore., July 8.—Five men who attempted to blow the safe at Thompson's general store at Dodgett on the Corvallis-Newport highway were frightened away before their job was completed about three o'clock this morning. They had removed the outer door of the safe and were ready to blow off the inner door when the sudden whirring of a small electric motor in the store basement scared them into instant departure.

## MEDFORD WORKERS FORM ASSOCIATION

## GERMANY AGREES TO LIMIT ARMS TRAFFIC

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## STEWART QUILTS AS COMMANDER OF UMPQUA POST

After Three Years Service Resigns to Head State Department.

## TO BE GIVEN SUPPORT

Local Post Will Strive to Cooperate With Him in Every Way—Plans Laid for Drive.

Dr. E. B. Stewart, commander of Umpqua Post of the American Legion, last night tendered his resignation, in order that he may devote his entire time to his office as commander of the state department, the office to which he was elected at the recent state convention at Prineville. Although the members of the post greatly regret the necessity of his resigning from the position which he has filled so ably, they feel that he can be of so much greater service by heading the state department, than in working with the local post, as they have willingly accepted the resignation and pledged their support in the state work. 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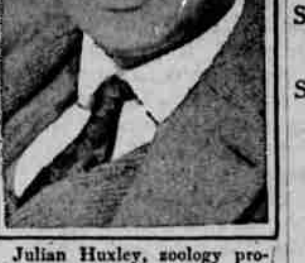
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## Calls W. J. Bryan Argument Absurd

Julian Huxley, zoology professor in Oxford university, England, and son of Thomas Huxley, famous scientist, says William Jennings Bryan's arguments against evolution are absurd. He points to the fact that Anglican (Church of England) clergymen accept evolution as an incontrovertible fact.

DAYTON, Tenn., July 8.—William Jennings Bryan's definition of evolution is "guesses strung together." Mr. Bryan, who to take part in the prosecution of John T. Scopes for violating the Tennessee law against the teaching of evolution theories in the public schools, so defined evolution last night in an address at a banquet given in his honor. The defendant and the former secretary of state chatted in the hotel lobby where the banquet was served before the dinner and Scopes sat directly across the table from the speaker. Mr. Bryan in his address says that properties forced him to confine his remarks to a restricted discussion of the pending case, but he was emphatic in his declaration that "the people will tell the teacher what to teach."

## Colby Won't Take Part in Scopes Trial

CHICAGO, July 8.—Clarence Darrow, Chicago, associate counsel for John T. Scopes, received a telegram today from Hainbridge Colby, former secretary of state, advising he would not be present at the Dayton trial. Mr. Colby said the recent decision of the appellate division of the New York supreme court invalidating the New York home rule statute brought about a situation which prevented his leaving the city for some time. He expressed his regrets and sent his best wishes for the success of the proceedings. He said the court decision had brought about a confused situation in New York municipal affairs, involving "continued study and conference."

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DAYTON, Tenn., July 8.—William Jennings Bryan, of counsel for the prosecution in the case of John T. Scopes, charged with violating the Tennessee law against teaching evolution theories in the schools, today announced the addition of another lawyer to his side. The latest lawyer in the much discussed case is William Jennings Bryan, Jr., now living in Los Angeles, Cal., but formerly assistant United States attorney in Arizona. Mr. Bryan said that his son was on the way to Dayton and should arrive tomorrow.

## Actor Shot After Quarrel With His Wife Who Was Former Chorus Favorite; In Critical Condition

NEW YORK, July 8.—Allan Davis, 25, an actor in "The White Cargo" is in a critical condition, having been shot by his wife, Edith Parker, 26, who was once considered one of the most beautiful chorus girls in Earl Carroll's "Vantiles," but who recently, in stage parlance, has been "cat herby." There had been no inkling along the Rialto of domestic troubles, in fact they were regarded as ideal lovers. "In fact it was all over another woman," said Mrs. Davis, after questioning by detectives. She added that she had intended to end it all, and a deed in an unframed cartridge apparently bore out her statement. But she tried to kill herself. She was held at a police station on charges of felonious assault. "I never want to see her again," said Davis to detectives in asking that she be denied admission to the hospital. One bullet entered a shoulder and another his head.
