PLANS ARE MADE FOR ENTERTAINING NAVY CRUISERS

ASTORIA, Ore., July 8.—Tentative plans for the entertainment of the officers, midshipmen and sailors who will visit Astoria July 19 to 21 on the three battleships taking the Annapolis men on their cruise, have been completed by the chamber of commerce committee and submitted to Rear-Admiral Vogelzang, cruise commander.

Members of the Portland and Astoria naval base committee will lay the need for the base before Secretary of the Navy Curtis D. Wilbur and will give him ever opportunity to inspect the site of the base.

The warships are scheduled to arrive here about noon on July 19. Sunday afternoon and evening will be given over to Seaside; no attempt being made to entertain the naval men in Astoria. On Monday morning a parade of the midshipmen, seamen and marines, headed by the bands of the battleships, will be held on the streets of Astoria and will be followed by a boxing smoker.

In the afternoon ball games will be played between teams from the ships and in the evening there will be dances in several Astoria halls for the midshipmen and sailors and a banquet for Secretary of the Navy Wilbur and the officers of the squadron. The ships will leave some time Tuesday.

Officers of the firm framed application for re-admission to the board and when the formalities are completed the company will take over all open grain contracts now in the name of the Grain Marketing Company.

Rosenbaum Brothers Grain Company, a second unit in the proposed merger and a factor in the bankruptcy proceedings against Dean, Onativia & Company, also sought re-admission to the exchange clearing house in the old corporate title.

SECRETARY WORK IS MAKING TOUR OREGON PROJECTS

SALEM, Ore., July 8.—Dr. Hubert Work, secretary of the Interior in the cabinet of President Coolidge, was puzzled today when he inspected the Salem Indian training school at Chemawa. It was in the kitchen of a domestic science department. On a blackboard was written a recipe for cake-baking. The cabinet member's brow wrinkled as he studied the written instructions. "What does B. P. stand for?" he asked the instructor. "Baking powder," answered the teacher.

Some folks in these parts are afraid Secretary Work's ideas are eastern. But his conversation and his drawl are decidedly western. In an easy, winning way he questioned instructors and students as he passed through the buildings. "You have those scissors upside down," he said to an Indian maiden from Montana who was cutting out pieces for a garment in the domestic arts department. "Where you from?" he asked another.

"California," the girl replied. "Do you want to go back there?" "I surely do." "That's funny," the secretary said.

"I don't see why you want to go back to California when you can stay here." "Where are you from?" Dr. Work asked an instructor in another department. "From Alabama," the young woman said.

"She won't stay long," the cabinet member remarked to the superintendent, who was showing him about the school. "When they look like that they soon get married."

The Indian problem is a big one, Secretary Work declared, but the big part of it is not in the schools, but after the students leave the schools. "The thing to do," he said, "is to teach them the things by which they can make a living after they are out of schools."

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—Hubert Work, secretary of the Interior, and Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation, returned this morning from Salem, Ore., where they visited friends last night and today and inspected the Chemawa Indian school. Governor Pierce accompanied the party from Portland to Salem.

Most of the morning the officials were engaged in conferences at the Chamber of Commerce. First they met a delegation from the Umatilla Rapids Association relative to work on that project. Next they conferred with a delegation from the Deschutes project. At noon Secretary Work and Commissioner Mead were guests of the chamber of commerce at a luncheon, and Secretary Work made a short talk. After the luncheon the party took a trip over the Columbia highway. They are to join a 12-7 speed car at Hood River this evening. They intend to spend the remainder of the week in eastern Oregon inspecting the Itaker, Gwybes and Warm Springs projects. They will then go to Idaho.
