OYSTERY HATCHERY IN NORTHWEST
SEATTLE, July 9.—An oyster hatchery to produce several million oysters a season is the work this summer of Professor Trewey Kincaid, in charge of the oyster department of the University of Washington. His object is to commercialize the Japanese oyster which lays 700,000 eggs in a few days. Kincaid seeks to retain these eggs and develop them into oysters, through the hatching of Japanese eggs has not previously been successful in this country. The hatchery is near Bellinham, 140 miles north of here, and is one of three oyster hatcheries in the world, the other two being in New York and Connecticut.

TWO CARAVANS OF ELKS COMING TO ROSEBURG SUNDAY

SALEM, Ore., July 9.—Two automobile caravans of California Elks, enroute to the national convention in Portland will be escorted through the state by the state traffic department during the week-end. State Traffic Inspector T. A. Rafferty announced today. A caravan of 25 or 30 cars of Eureka and Crescent City Elks, traveling over the Redwood highway, is due at the state line Saturday noon where they will be met by officers of the state traffic department. A Bakerfield caravan of 25 cars, traveling over the Pacific highway is due at the Southern Oregon state line at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Chief Rafferty will attempt to bring the two caravans together at Grants Pass as they may travel together the remainder of the trip to Portland. While traveling in California the caravans will be escorted by the California traffic department. They are expected to reach Salem late Sunday.

ELK TRAINS WILL PASS THROUGH CITY FROM JULY 10 TO 18

Nineteen trainloads of members of the Elk lodges in various cities of the United States, will pass through Roseburg between the 9th and 18th of the month, on the way to or from the national convention at Portland. Lodges from New York, Cleveland, Chicago, San Francisco, Cincinnati, Jersey City, Pittsburg, Dallas, Philadelphia, cities of New England and Florida, New Orleans, Detroit, Los Angeles, and Pasadena, will be among those passing through Roseburg. Only a few of the trains will go through during the day time, the majority of them reaching the city during the early morning. The trains are scheduled to arrive as follows: July 10, New York, 1:45 a. m.; Ohio train, 6:15 a. m.; July 11, Chicago, 3:30 a. m.; July 12, San Francisco, 1:45 a. m.; July 17, Cincinnati, 3:45 a. m.; Jersey City, 1:15 a. m.; Pittsburg, 3:35 a. m.; Dallas, 7:30 a. m.; Philadelphia, New England 4:15 p. m.; July 17, 8:45 a. m.; New York 3:20 p. m.; Florida 5:45 a. m.; July 12, Cleveland, 11:25 p. m.; July 13, New Orleans, 12:25 a. m.; Detroit, 1:15 a. m.; Los Angeles, 1:25 a. m.; Pasadena, 7:15 a. m. FARMERS NEWS

New Potato Grading Law Now in Effect.
(By H. W. Cooney.)
Farmers of the county will be interested in Oregon's new potato law. The main features of this law are:
1. The requirement that all potatoes offered for sale shall be graded into four main grades, as follows:
1. U. S. No. 1 Fancy, U. S. No. 1, U. S. No. 1 small, U. S. No. 2, and U. S. No. 3 Grade.
2. The law sets forth quite clearly the requirements for each grade.
3. New sacks or good seconds shall be used in marketing all U. S. No. 1 stock.
4. Every sack must be stenciled showing the grower's name, address, and the grade contained within the sack.
5. Potatoes sold for seed must state in addition to the above, the variety of potato.
6. In the future it will be unlawful to use the word "Certified Seed Potatoes" unless the sack actually contains stock, certified by representatives of the College having authority to certify under certain rules and regulations. Potatoes properly coming under this class will be sealed by the certification board. The attachment of this seal will be prima facie evidence of certification. The law carries certain penalties for violation and should be obeyed by every one growing, distributing or shipping potatoes. The Department of Farm Crops of O. A. C. is prepared to furnish any one with cut stencil for labeling sacks at a cost of 25 cents per stencil. Orders for stencils should be pooled through the office of the County Agent to secure the above price. Copies of the law may be had and sample of stencil can be seen at the County Agent's office.

They must put their own price on their own goods and maintain it. Their must buy together as well. Organized as tightly as other classes, the farmer's business wouldn't be the football it is now for the middle men to kick around. expenses increase their production costs, they simply raise the selling price and pass it along. Such is the power of thorough organization. But one of the nation's biggest industries—agriculture, is not organized, except in spots. The resources of agriculture in this country are inexhaustible. It is a giant industry, on which the prosperity of cities depend, yet it is the poorest industry in all the country—the day laborer is more prosperous in comparison. And the farmers themselves are largely to blame for this condition. While all other industries have organized for profits, the general farmers continue the same old individual process. When they came to sell they were selling to organizations, not as one organization to another, but as individuals, a farmer here and there, and they sell at the price the organizations set for them. The business of the world is handled through organizations now and the farmers business is also—as soon as it leaves his hands. The individual farmer stands a poor chance against such odds. He simply competes with his neighbor in helping the middle interests to hold his product prices to cost of production. Farmers must organize and do business collectively. It is no greater undertaking than the organization of labor, which seemed almost impossible when first un-
