CARPENTERS' UNION WILL HOLD MEETING FRIDAY EVENING

For Cameron, general representative of the Carpenters' International Union, arrived in the city last night and is remaining over Friday to address an open meeting of the local union. This meeting will be educational in nature, and is open to union men and non-union men alike. It will be held at the Moose Hall at 8 o'clock. Mr. Cameron says that the union which he represents has had a wonderful growth. In 1916 it had a membership of 152,000, and a capital of \$200,000. Now the membership totals 400,000 with a capital stock of \$1,500,000. Recently the organization paid \$700,000 for 1,500 acres of land in Florida for a home for aged members. It pays monthly about \$50,000 for death and disability, he states.

CASE OF FISHING RIGHTS ON ISLAND TO GO TO COURTS

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
WASHINGTON, July 8.—The controversy between the government and the state of Oregon over the control of fishing rights on Sand Island at the mouth of the Columbia river probably will be fought in the courts.

The issue has been brought to a head, it was announced today at the Department of Justice by the state fisheries board issuing a lease to the Columbia River Packers Association despite a protest of the United States attorney on behalf of the government.

If the state's lease carries out its announced intentions to begin at once the laying of fishing and casting nets, the action will constitute in the opinion of the department a "trespass" and the United States attorney has been instructed to commence injunction proceedings when such action is taken.

The department's announcement added that leases of the United States on their fishing sites on the island probably would cooperate with the government in the litigation.

The fishing privileges for some time have been leased by the government but the state recently protested on the ground that the island property, turned over to the War Department years ago for military purposes, had not been used for such.

CRITICISM OF THE YOUNG FOLK WRONG

REDFORD, Ore., July 8.—Criticizing the younger generation is the greatest disease of the age and it is generally prevalent not only in present day books, newspapers and lectures but also among parents, according to Mrs. Kate Jauison, dean of women at the Oregon Agricultural College, who spoke before the housewives' institute here on "housekeeping or home-making."

"Mothers must organize if they would counteract the organization which exists among the young folks of today. They are now in a class by themselves, and they do what they want to do."

"When the mother of a high school girl says, 'you must not go to parties on week nights,' the girl says 'but Johnnie and Mary are going.' If all mothers got together and agreed that there would be no week night social affairs for their daughters, they could stop them. I have known the modern girl ever since I began teaching in the grade schools. She is as good as we are if we give her a chance."

Mrs. Jessie D. McComb, home demonstration leader with the extension department of the Oregon Agricultural College is in general charge of the housewives' institute, which is the first to be held in central Oregon.

NEW YORK, July 8.—Mickey Walker of Elizabeth, N. J., world's welterweight champion, will meet Dave Shade of California, his most persistent challenger, in a 15-round decision match in New York state if a reliable promoter can be obtained to stage the match, the state athletic commission announced today following a conference with the two principals.

Both Shade and Walker denied they had signed contracts for a title match in Vernon, Cal., July 21. Contracts for the proposed match were exhibited to the commission, but these contained only the signature of Jack Doyle, the Vernon promoter.

While only tentative terms were discussed the principals agreed to ever suggestion of the commission and left the conference promising to return next Tuesday to sign articles of agreement. The commission intimated it would turn these articles, after they are signed, over to a reliable promoter. Jimmy De Forest, matchmaker of the Polo Grounds A. C., already has Shade's signature for a match and it is expected that he will make a strong bid for the title match. Tex Rickard, who holds the boxing rights to the Yankee Stadium, also will likely bid for this match, which looms now as the most important ring contest of the season.
