SHIP MUCH LUMBER

(Associated Press Special Wire.)
MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 9.—Lumber totalling 66,557,967 feet and worth \$2,958,032 was exported from the port of Marshfield during

the 12 months ending June 30, according to a report just issued by the customs house. The reports show a marked decline from the previous fiscal year of about 36,000,000 feet with a value of about \$10,500,000. This year's foreign

cargoes were shipped as compared to 61 last year, but there was only one cargo less to the Atlantic, the number being 13 for 1925 and 14 for 1924. Business for the last half showed little difference from the first half of the year.

HUSBAND FORMER ROSEBURG GIRL DIES IN PENDLETON

Word has been received from Pendleton of the death of Richard D. Cornwell, the husband of Mrs. Anne Cornwell, formerly Anne Caldwell, a teacher for several years in the Benson school of this city.

Mr. Cornwell, who was 44 years of age, was a member of Pendleton's police force, and one of the most popular men of the city. He was a veteran of the world war and his death was the direct result of gas and nervous shock, which brought on valvular heart disease. His funeral was conducted by the American Legion post.

COMMERCIAL SECRETARIES TALK ON VITAL TOPICS

EUGENE, Ore., July 10.—Today is the fifth day of the annual short course for commercial secretaries at the University of Oregon, which closes with a banquet and dance in the Women's building tonight. C. E. Wilson, Salem, will open the session this morning with the discussion on "getting your activities into print." Following this "Oregon a National playground" will be discussed by Leonard Hilkey, of Albany. The health of White Wood products will be the topic of Professor F. Stafford, head of the University of Oregon department of chemistry, for a short lecture.

During the afternoon session, J. H. Fuller of Astoria will lead the discussion of "characteristics of Oregon," followed by "the question box" under the leadership of Earl Murray of Marshfield.

E. C. Simmons, of Eugene, will lead the "Aviation in Oregon" at the assembly held yesterday. "The Pacific coast must have more industrial landing places with accompanying emergency landing fields before any real progress can be successfully accomplished," he declared.
