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## HOTEL COMPANY GETS ADDITIONAL BUILDING PERMIT

The Rose Investment company today secured a building permit in the sum of \$40,000, covering the additions and alterations made to the hotel which the company is constructing at the corner of Stephens and Lane streets. This hotel was originally planned for three stories, and was to be of concrete and wood construction. Since it was started the plans have been altered so that it is now five stories in height and is of fire-proof construction throughout. The only wood in the entire building is to be found in the window and door casings. All partitions are of tile or plaster block, while the floors and walls are all poured reinforced concrete. The original permit was in the sum of \$55,000, and the new permit \$40,000, making a \$95,000 building in all.

Other permits issued were to Harold Woodruff for a \$200 wood and stucco building on S. Stephens street, near the city limits, to be used for a store building; to Henry Andrie for a \$4,000, two-story concrete building in the rear of the Roseburg Apartment house for business purposes, and to Mrs. H. B. Rowman for a \$100 garage building on the corner of Flint and Mosher streets.

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## JUSTICE ISSUES ALTERNATIVE WRIT. IN TOBACCO BILL

SALEM, July 10.—Chief Justice McBride of the supreme court yesterday issued an alternative writ of review in an original proceeding filed for the purpose of getting a change made in the ballot title of the tobacco tax referendum bill. It is the case of the state on relation of John H. Carson, dist. attorney for Marion county, against Secretary of State Koser and the Oregon Retail Tobacco Dealers' Association. The defendants must make answer in the case of July 24. The case is an appeal from the lower court where Judge McMahon dismissed the case on grounds that the wrong procedure was being followed by the plaintiffs. The petitioners aver that it does not properly describe the act.

JOHN D. DIEBES ESTATE TO SON.

WHITE PLAINS, N. J., July 10.—John D. Rocketteller today bequeathed to his son, John D. Rocketteller, Jr., his Pleasant Hills estate at Tarrytown, his home for many years and valued at \$1,733,500. The deed was filed with the West Chester county registrar.

County officials said that the bequeathing of the estate to his son by Mr. Rocketteller would exempt it from heavy inheritance taxes which would be assessed if the property were inherited. The officials said such taxes would have totalled several hundred thousands of dollars.

JAP SCHOOLS TO CONTEST HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE LAW  
HONOLULU, July 10.—(A. P.)—Revision of regulations adopted by the territorial school committee appears to have made no material change in the attitude of the 85 litigating Japanese language

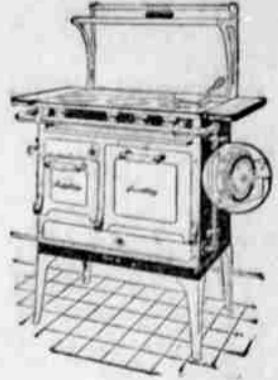
schools. The modification which permits an eight year course by eliminating the former requirement that attendants at a foreign language school must first have completed the first two grades of a public school, has been characterized by attorneys for the lit-

igants as a step in the right direction toward bringing about an amicable adjustment of the controversy. The 85 schools are inactive, having closed their doors to avoid being fined for non-payment of the annual fee at the rate of \$1 a pu-

pli. There is in preparation a suit to enjoin the territorial officials from enforcing the provisions of the alien language law, as amended by the legislature of 1925. Thirty schools having complied with the territorial requirements are operating.
