## PORTLAND WILL HAVE PROGRAM FOR ITS BUYERS' WEEK

PORTLAND, Oregon, July 10—(Special)—A good will builder for Portland throughout its trade territory, and that stretches for these days, is the objective aimed at by Portland's thirteenth annual Buyers' Week, August 3-8.

Just how far the Rose City reaches out its trade connections may be guessed from the fact that the Buyers' Week Executive Committee, working through the Trade & Commerce Department of the Chamber of Commerce, has sent out 50,000 invitations to as many merchants in 14 Western states, as well as Alaska and British Columbia.

A wider response than ever before is expected by those sponsoring the trade event. Every year sees a bigger week and this summer's trade event, it is agreed, will outdo all others.

Entertainment features, always notable, have been planned that will surpass anything that has gone before. Only an inkling of the five nights that are combined with the five days to make up the week is given by the committee here.

Some features will be "Nymphs of the Woods", Marine Frolic, Where the Ships of the Seven Seas Meet, "A Bit of the Orient", fireworks display and other events, including a golf tournament. Visiting merchants are using their favorite zo-f clubs.

Executives of Buyers' Week will meet the visitors and do everything possible to make their stay pleasant. One of the reasons why merchants should take advantage of the week's opportunities is that reduced railroad fare is offered on 18 lines, with return ticket good until August 12. Besides, purchase of a minimum of \$500 from the jobbers and manufacturers who are backing the trade feature will earn a refund of railroad fare.

Nathan Strauser, founder of Buyers' Week and an active member of this year's executive committee, points out that sales of goods during the week form a secondary consideration. The first essential, he declares, is to get outside merchants to accept Portland's invitation to come and thus establish closer contacts and a more friendly relation between heads of Portland's leading wholesale and jobbing houses and their customers.

Frank A. Spencer is chairman of the Executive Committee in charge of the week and he is assisted by 22 other leaders in the city's commerce. E. N. Weinbaum, manager of the Trade & Commerce Department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, is in active charge as Secretary of the General Committee.
