MARKETS

PORTLAND, July 10.—The Oregon crop of all wheat gives promise of about 18,000,000 bushels, according to F. L. Kent, Oregon statistician for the department of agriculture. Dry weather in June affected the crop at 9,500,000 bushels as compared to 8,500,000 bushels last year, and a probable potato production of 4,950,000 bushels as compared to an Oregon crop of 3,780,000 bushels last year.

As high as 16 cents was paid for fancy country dressed calves along the street yesterday afternoon, although 14 to 15 cents is the ruling price on choice light veal. Receipts have been unusually light this week and butchers are willing to pay a premium for real fancy stuff. Choice light hogs are also scarce and the market firm at 19 to 19 1/2 cents. Poultry demand is unusually brisk with daily arrivals moving out promptly. Heavy hogs are firm at 23 to 24 cents with light hogs at 16 to 18 cents. Springs sell from 15 to 25 cents, the higher figure prevailing on colored stock. Ducks steady at 20 cents. Eggs are lower with extras of another cent on the exchange at 34 cents. Current receipts eased off a half cent, now being posted at 32 1/2 cents net. Other grades are unchanged. Cube butter prices declined on the exchange. Standards are down to 45 cents with prime firsts at 43 cents. Demand is still good, however, for top score stock. Cream receipts show slight gain.

ONTARIO, Ore., July 10.—Following a meeting here this morning when the merits of the Owyhee reclamation project were discussed, Hubert Work, secretary of the Interior, issued the following statement for publication:
"If as some claim, I am compelled by law to build the Baker project, quite regardless of the opinion of the secretary of the interior as to its feasibility, I shall not delay its construction. I do not believe it is feasible under existing laws, and experts, both of the bureau of reclamation and the department of agriculture, have so reported to me."

BLOODLESS REVOLT IN PERU REPORTED

LYMA, Peru, July 10.—El Comercio's correspondent at Guayaquil, Ecuador, reports the overthrow of the Ecuadorian government at Quito by a bloodless military movement. It is not known whether the movement was directed only against the cabinet or also against President Cordova.
The dispatch says government officials at Quito were imprisoned and that the movement is believed to have been widespread in Ecuador.

PARTY PLANS TO INSPECT ROAD UP N. UMPQUA

(Continued from Page 1)
The delegations from the neighboring cities.
The party will go to the end of the new road work by automobile. Horses will be provided for them there, and they will ride to Camp Habee to spend the night. The next day they will ride to the road camp above the canyon.
The third day they will ride from the road camp to Diamond Lake and return, going to the lake by way of Oak Flats and returning through Mountain Meadows. The fourth day they will return to the Habee and reach home on the fifth day.
The Forest Service is providing transportation and food, and the members of the party will be at no expense. Horse wranglers will be provided by the forest service.
The North Umpqua road project is one of the most important propositions. It is stated, to be brought before the people of Douglas County since the road to Reedport was put through.
Douglas County now has a road from Roseburg to Reedport, and another from Roseburg to Coos Bay, Bandon and coast points in Coos and Curry counties. There is a road east of Roseburg, up the North Umpqua to Rock Creek, and the government is building up the river from that point, and will complete the road to Steamboat this year. On the other end, the forest service is building from Diamond Lake to Big Canons. This leaves about 22 miles to connect up. When completed the road will connect with Eastern Oregon, one road branching off to Bend, and the other going to Klamath Falls, by way of Diamond Lake and Crater Lake, or Union Creek. It will also intersect with the Skyline road, so that it will be a most important highway when eventually opened.
The chamber of commerce recently appointed a committee to investigate the road needs of the county, and this committee reported that Umpqua highway to be the first for consideration. It was proposed that a trip of inspection be made in order that everybody might be better acquainted with the proposition, and all arrangements have been made for the trip, starting on the 15th.

NEW EVIDENCE IS FOUND IN ASTORIA POISON MYSTERY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
ASTORIA, Ore., July 10.—In the light of evidence in possession of investigating attorneys the discovery of poison in the stomach of Mrs. Crawford White, who was killed in Seattle nearly two years ago, would constitute a strong link in the proof of murder, counsel for Mrs. White's family declared here today. An order for exhumation of the body and an analysis of the vital organs was issued yesterday in response to a petition of Mrs. White's mother, Mrs. Mary Sjoblom.
While J. O. Erickson, former Clatsop county district attorney, is continuing to handle the Astoria investigation, C. W. Robinson, criminal law expert, has left for Seattle to further probe the mystery of the woman's death in that city. The exhumation of the body may be delayed several days pending investigations of Robinson in Seattle.
It is the contention of relatives that Mrs. White was poisoned and then shot to give her death the appearance of suicide. The bullet wound is in the left temple and an attempt will be made to show that it entered at an angle which made it impossible for Mrs. White, who was right handed, to have fired the shot.
It is also the contention of Erickson, that the body was railroaded to the grave.
