GETTING READY FOR BOY SCOUT SUMMER CAMP

Trail Being Opened Up to Allow Transportation of Supplies.

WANT APPLICATIONS

Effort Being Made to Secure Names of All Who Will Go So Supplies May Be Bought.

Last night after the ball game the scout executive and four scouts left for the Wolf Creek camp site. They will open up the trail from the road into camp and widen it out so as to allow for easier transportation of supplies. They will also clean off the camp ground and clear off another small section adjoining it. They will return tonight.

As the camp opens on July 21, every effort is being put forth to arrange all details prior to that time. Mr. Britton reports that the camp his year will be better attended and will be conducted on a bigger scale than ever before.

The applications for camp are coming in pretty well but inasmuch as food supplies must be bought within the next week all applications should be in by not later than next Wednesday, Mr. Britton says.

A good cook, Tom Shotwell, has been secured for this season and in order to be assured of good eats and plenty of them it is necessary that the amount be figured correctly.

There has been considerable talk regarding a summer camp for boys who are under the boy scout age but as yet no definite action has been taken. One suggested plan has been talked over and considered feasible. That is to hold the camp under the direction of the Douglas County Council, Boy Scouts of America, to take boys of nine, ten and eleven years; to hold the camp somewhere near town and for a period of one week or ten days; to give practically the same training as Boy Scouts get but in the elementary stages; to teach swimming provided a good safe place can be secured for that.

Before any action can be taken in this matter, though, it will be necessary for parents desiring to take advantage of such a camp to make known their wishes regarding such a camp.

All parents interested should address or phone Boy Scouts of America within the next few days so that a meeting can be arranged for and plans made before the regular Boy Scout Camp begins at Wolf Creek, Tuesday 21st of this month.

Such a camp would allow for some excellent outdoor training and outing for the younger fellows who are aching to become scouts.

The Boy Scouts also stand ready to support the Campfire Girls in assisting them in preparing a camp for their outing, Mr. Britton states.
